

## Services to Libraries: 1st Legislative District

The Washington State Library (WSL) is the only agency in Washington that is specifically designated by law to assist libraries and to ensure that residents of the entire state have access to library and information services. WSL achieves these goals using federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funds, offering projects to improve libraries, consulting services, grants, subsidies and training to libraries.

Examples of services include support for digital literacy programming, Microsoft Office training and industry-recognized certification, early literacy programming, professional grants, specialized training for library administration, circulating STEM kits, group cost-sharing for online databases, and 24/7 online reference support for college students and Washington residents.

## Impact of LSTA Library Funding: 1st District



Brier Elementary received a Future STEMs from Reading grant, which provided 50 new nonfiction books to the library. The STEM books that Brier Elementary received increased circulation by 100 percent in the first quarter! In addition to nonfiction pleasure reading, the books are being used for research. Its librarian reports that the new materials have greatly helped meet their need for books. In just the first two months, 62 percent of the students benefited from these materials for research and classroom learning.

Nineteen schools in this district received a Refreshing School Libraries grant, which provided \$1,000 to each library to update their nonfiction sections. One librarian reported great enthusiasm for these "current, attractive, informative books in areas of student interest." Since the library was able to choose the books they needed she was able to tailor her choices to specific interests of the students and teachers.
