

Services to Libraries: 14th Legislative District

The Washington State Library (WSL) is the only agency in Washington that is specifically designated by law to assist libraries and to ensure that residents of the entire state have access to library and information services. WSL achieves these goals using federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funds, offering projects to improve libraries, consulting services, grants, subsidies and training to libraries.

Examples of services include support for digital literacy programming, Microsoft Office training and industry-recognized certification, early literacy programming, professional grants, specialized training for library administration, circulating STEM kits, group cost-sharing for online databases, and 24/7 online reference support for college students and Washington residents.

The Washington State Library has invested in several STEM kits, with technologies ranging from programmable robots to Lego building kits. These kits, designed to engage children with technology, are available to any public library in the state. One of these kits, called Ozobots, visited the Yakima Valley Libraries this year. The librarian reported that "Kids and Teens loved coding both ways. The techie way on the iPad and the non-techie way of using color markers. The program was a great success for us!"

Four schools in this district received a Refreshing School Libraries grant, which provided \$1,000 to each library to update its nonfiction collection. Their librarian told us, "The addition of new and modern science, history, and art books with excellent photos and illustrations has piqued and/or renewed the interest of many students in these areas. The students and teachers are excited about the books I purchased."
