THE CHENOWERE CHARGES against Judge Greene and District Attorney Allen, telegraphed recently from Washington, have been generally commented upon by the press of the Territory. Mr. Chenoweth lives within a stone's throw of this office, he having removed to this county soon after his unfortunate experience in Lewis county with a piece of in Lewis county with a piece of school section land. He is a hardworking, industrious man who "has seen better days," and we have often heard from his own lips the story of the prosecutions under which he has working, industrious man who "has seen better day," and we have often heard from his own lips the story of the prosecutions under which he has suffered. From his own showing he has certainly been the victim of frivolous and malicious prosecution to an aggravating extent, but we can not agree with him that Judge Greene and District Attorney Allen were responsible therefor. His envious neighbors who desired the use of the tract of school land which he had fenced in and occupied, under lease from the county, and who we have reason to believe were ten times more guilty of trespass on the public domain than Chenoweth, were the complainants in the case, and responsible for the whole trouble. Chenoweth was undoubtedly guilty of a technical violation of the law, but manifestly not such violation as the law had in contemplation, for the jury in the case merely assessed the damages to the United States at one dollar. We are loth to bland Mr. Chenoweth for feeling so sorely aggrieved at being turned out of house and home in the declining years of life in this his native land, so rich and oppulent in domain and revenue. We are to presume, however, that the Judge at least had no knowledge of the fasts and circumstances of the case, and was not therefore responsible for the result of the prosecution. It is proper to add that the President finally granted a pardon in the case, but this does not allay Mr. Chenoweth's hostility; and hence the charges recently preferred against these judicial officers, which, by the way, we exceedingly regret to see. Still we apprehend no serious consequences to Judge Greene or Mr. Allen, for it is the outside persecution of covetous neighbors, rather than the legal prosecution, that lends an aspect of oppression and injustice to this case. Had the Court been fully advised of the facts in the case, the prosecution would in all probability have been dispensed with as in our opinion it should have been.
