

—The value of the cotton plant, it would seem, has been increased by the discovery that the bark of the roots yield a promising dye-stuff. It appears that, when the bark of cotton root is exhausted by alcohol of the specific gravity of 0.84, a dark reddish-brown liquid is obtained, which, when distilled to recover the spirit, leaves a resinous matter which amounts to eight per cent. of the original weight of the bark. The new product thus obtained appears black and shining, but when pulverized takes the color of cochineal. It dissolves in fourteen parts of alcohol, fifteen of chloroform, and 123 of benzol; it dissolves also un caustic alkalies, and is precipitated from those solutions by addis. Hydrate of potash colors green. Sulphurle acid dissolves it with a red-brown coler.—X. Y. Sun.

Tunnel Through the Pyrenees.

A Spanish correspondent of the Journal des Debats reports that the greatest activity prevails throughout the northern part of Spain and at Madrid in connection with the projected tunnel through the Pyrenees, to unite the French and Spanish rallway systems. The bill passed by the Cortes, and sanctioned by the King last December, is cordially approved of by the inhabitants of Arragon and Catalonia, who will be the chief gainers by the improved communication with their French neighbors in the southern provinces. Money will not be wanting to carry out this useful scheme, for a company, started in Sarrgossa to take up part of the work, was offered more than five times the requisite capital. The Government share in the undertaking will consist of a subsidy of the tunnel at Canfranc. In addition to the new lines for rallway, and half the expense of the tunnel at Canfranc.
