An important point in the use of electricity for lighting purposes was passed recently in New York by the turning on of the Edison Company's currents in a part of the down town district of that city. Heretofore the electric light seen in this country at least were for show rather than for use, but these are for use alone, and the vital questions of expense can now be demonstrated to the satisfaction of what President Lincoln called "plain people." This item of the cost of the electric light for ordinary uses is still enveloped in a thick mist in so far as the general public is concerned, for the lights that have been placed in the up town hotels and stores are there merely as advertisements, not even of the merits of the light itself, but of the stock with which the financial market is overburdened. The expense of producing the light has been treated by the promoters of the various companies as a very secondary matter excepting on paper, when it always appeared as almost ridiculously small. All the figures that the public has about the cost of the light are those based on Edison's experiments, but as everybody who has looked into the subject knows, there is often a very great difference between estimates based on experiments and actual working results, and such may be the result here. From the figures furnished by Mr. Edison scientists have figured out that the difference between the cost of gas and electricity will be found to be about twenty per cent. in favor of the latter, but the Edison people claim a greater difference. It may be found, however, that even the estimate of the former is too low, and that obstacles heretofore regarded as trivial may be found very serious.

The National Bar Association, which recently decided to draw up and recommend to the different Legislatures a uniform law relating to real estate sales and records, can easily keep itself busy in this line of work. When it gets its real estate code adopted by the thirty-seven separate and independent commonwealths it can turn its attention to the marriage and divorce laws, which which are fully as contradictory and chaotic as those affecting landed property. Then they might take the laws about commercial debts in hand, and by the time they get through with these they would have some conception of the immensity of the task still ahead of them. They might just as well come out in favor of the Federal Congress providing all the States with a new and uniform code at once—in fact, they will see that plan carried out long before they can reasonably hope to secure uniformity in the manner they propose. At their next meeting they had better come out boldly for doing away with the supererogation of State laws in the matter of civil law, or in criminal law for that matter also.

The trade dollar is soon to pass out of existence, the national House of Representatives having passed a bill authorizing its retirement from circulation. The bill provides that until the first of July, 1884, any person may deposit at any mint in the Union trade dollars and receive in exchange at full weight, dollar for dollar, standard silver dollars. The trade dollars thus received at the mints are to be regarded as silver bullion, and be deemed a part of the monthly purchase of bullion required by the act of 1878. All laws authorizing the coinage and issue of the trade dollar are repealed.

At the International Conference on Commercial Law, at Liverpool, presided over by Lord O'Hagan, a discussion arose upon a proposal to expunge the words "by the act of God" from bills of lading. David Dudley Field suggested, instead, the words "superhuman cause." M. Olivet said the term was useless, the tendency of modern legislation being to omit reference to divinity. M. Glover protested against discussing the tendency of Continental legislation. Eventually the words "by the act of God" were retained, by 27 to 12 votes.

It is now a settled thing that the war in Egypt is rapidly drawing to a close. Arabi has been driven to his last extremity. But it has been evident from the outset that but one result could be looked for—the defeat of Arabi and England's gaining the supremacy in Egypt.

A Kentucky candidate recently got nobly drunk, and his indiscretion was widely telegraphed over his district. The result was that he was elected by forty thousand majority. Had he not been so drunk he would have been defeated. A fellow feeling makes a Kentuckian wondrous kind.

CARDINAL MANNING, the eminent Catholic divine, has just finished his seventy-fifth year, but is still in perfect health. Cardinal Manning was formerly a shining light in the Episcopal Church, and went to Rome to convert Pope Pius the Ninth. The result of his visit was that he was himself converted to the Catholic faith.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

The Democratic Convention convened at Whatcom on Tuesday, the 19th inst., and organized by electing H. A. Judson chairman, and Mat McElroy secretary.

A resolution was then offered by H. Clotier and accepted as follows: That we denounce the Sunday law as unjust, unconstitutional and impracticable, and that we instruct our representative to use all honorable means to have the same repealed.

C. Donovan, Mat McElroy, W. R. Moultry and M. McNamara were elected delegates to the Territorial Convention, and were instructed to support H. Clotier for Joint Representative and Mr. Blackman, of Snohomish, for Joint Councilman.

The following were then nominated by acclamation: James O'Loughlin for Sheriff; C. Donovan, Auditor; Harry Roeder, Treasurer; H. A. Judson School Supt.; W. T. Stoll, Probate Judge.

A number of nominations were then made for Commissioners, and upon a ballot being taken the following were declared elected: W. Smith, Geo. Savage and E. Hammond.

No nominations for surveyor, coroner or wreckmaster.

A Central Committee was then chosen consisting of nine: Jos. F. Dwelley, chairman; H. Clotier, M. McNamara, H. A. Judson, E. McAlpine, R. Bizer, J. Kavanagh and C. Donovan.

The Convention then adjourned sine die.

From a telegram received from Vancouver we learn that Thos. H. Brents received the nomination for Delegate to Congress, C. M. Bradshaw for Prosecuting Attorney and James Power for Councilman.

It is not generally known, says the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, but statistics demonstrate the fact, that Ezra Meeker is the largest hop raiser in the United States. This year he will gather a crop from 93 acres, the yield from which is estimated at 150,000 pounds. Next year he will have about 120 acres in hops alone. He has been offered 43 cents per pound for the entire crop, but this offer has been refused, he expects to realize at least 50 cents per pound for them before the season is over.

At a meeting recently held at the Chamber of Commerce in Seattle of citizens pledged to secure the right of way for the railroad between that place and Tacoma, a committee here to be appointed, consisting of Messrs. J. W. George, H. Butler and R. N. Armstrong, made a report as to the probable cost along the whole line, and were instructed to close negotiations with all the parties in Pierce County interested in the right of way. Messrs. Gutzort, Stone, and P. H. Lewis were appointed a committee to rate the different classes of land affected by the right of way in King County, and to act in conjunction with the first committee in securing the right of way.
