Amendments to the Donation Law. By the last mail we received from Hon Jo Lane the following bill, which has possed both Houses of Congress and been approved by the President :

N. ACT. 'to smend an act entitled 'An act to create the office of survyor general of the pub-ike lands in Oregon, and to provide for the sur-rey, and to make donations to the settlers of the said public lands,' approved the twenty-seventh of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty.
