DROWNED.—On Saturday, the 10th inst., a report was brought Mr. J. G. Clinger, the Coroner of this county, by Peter Clawson, that a dead man was lying in Snow Bay, just inside the entrance...

ACCIDENT.—Last Thursday week, and after our forms had gone to press, intelligence reached us of the helplessly, from Cape of Mr. Eldridge, of Chiltonum, from a tragic death.

It appears that while on his way home from this place, and when near Government Prairie, of a sudden, his horse stopped, and commenced rearing and plunging with an inclination to turn about, and it was not long ere Mr. Eldridge discovered that a bear with two cubs were in the road, a little in advance of him.

He then drove the horse to the left, and the bear, seeing the man, attempted to jump out, but his feet being entangled with branches in the bottom of the wagon, he fell and the horses extricating themselves from the vehicle, started to run into the brush, but the reins caught and they were finally held in place.

By this time Mr. Eldridge had recovered sufficiently to crawl to them, and managed to mount one, and in this condition pursued his way home. The cause of this trouble was telegraphed for and immediately rode out. He found upon investigation that one of the small bones of his left leg was broken and he was otherwise somewhat injured.

These were attended to and the patient is now doing as well as could be expected. The cause of the misfortune has not been seen since, but it undoubtedly still lurks in that vicinity, as it appears to be a favorite resort for brains.

NEARLY A CONFLAGRATION.—Last Monday night, between the hours of ten and 11 o'clock, a fire was discovered on the roof of Rothschild's & Co.'s store, but fortunately in time to prevent its spreading.

It appeared to be the result of an accident through an indiscriminate use of fireworks, the combustible material from which their descent alighted upon it. It was first observed by Mr. Fitzpatrick from his room on the opposite side of the street, and mainly through his immediate instrumentality extinguished. It is but proper to add in this connection that a petition to the town trustees, praying for the prohibition of fire-works within the town limits, was circulated through the town the next day which was unanimously signed, and no doubt an ordinance to that effect will be adopted by the Board.

OAK HARBOR.—Through the energy and perseverance of Mr. G. W. Morse and the Grangers at Oak Harbor, Whidley Island, number 15 now upon the ground for the construction of a hall, store, warehouse and wharf, that point for the accommodation of the harbor. The enterprise is expected to be completed early next month.

Steps are also being taken for the commencement of a mail route from Cleveland to Oak Harbor by the citizens of the latter place, where, it will be remembered an office was established last month. TURBULENT INDIANS.—Mr. Ellis, of the Skokomish Reservation was complained to by the citizens of Port Discovery and Dungeness about several Indians belonging to his reservation for their continued drunkenness and other disorders.

He visited those places and ordered the Indians to the reservation, but it seems they paid no regard to his authority. Whereupon he called on Capt. Selden, of the cutter Wolcott, to assist him, and on Tuesday the Wolcott proceeded to those places with Mr. Ellis, and arrested some of the offenders and brought them to this place for transportation to Skokomish. We are informed that during one of their drunken frolics at Port Discovery, on Monday night, one of the Indians broke the jaw of another one.

On Sunday evening last Rev. Mr. Rea held a service in Fowler's Hall, consisting chiefly in singing sacred songs, which was well attended and much appreciated by those present.

Mr. Rea announced that he would hold a similar service on next Sunday evening at 7 1/2 o'clock in the same hall. We hope to see a large attendance, especially from the lower town, as this will encourage the pastor, who has so generously volunteered these services, to continue them.
