Mr. O'Dell stood firm to the sentiments expressed in the section, and stated that he came to the convention pedged to sup-

expressed in the section, and stated that he came to the convention pledged to support such article. Mr. Dennison said that he liked the ring of the remarks of the gentlemen who had just spoken, but could not support such a measure except as a separate article.

Larrabee and Andrews expressed themselves similarly. Andrews' constituents

selves similarly. Andrews constituents had canvassed the matter in his county, and had directed him to use his influence against the introduction of such a section

into the constitution.

On motion the new section was rejected.
