THE HOSTILE SAVAGES.—The intense ignorance of the Government respecting the force of the hostile Indians is only equaled by the unparalleled stupidity of the Indian Department in furnishing supplies, and in allowing traders to furnish arms and ammunition to the savages.

Father Mesplie put down the Sioux at 60,000, Crowa 16,000, Blackfeet 20,000, Utes 25,000, and in addition there are the Brule, Ogallala, Miniconjou, Yanctonnais, Uncappa, Two Kettles, San Acres and Santoo bands.

With all these facts before them, the Indian Bureau, with its usual facility, is issuing to the Indians who pretend to be friendly, supplies of blankets, bacon and flour, which are immediately transferred to the hostile.

**DENOMINATIONAL NOTIS.**

There are 562 churches in Philadelphia. The Catholics have now 365 churches in Rome. The present number of churches in London is 802, an increase of 76 the past year. The American Adventists who are working in Switzerland have begun the publication of a French monthly paper. They issue 2000 copies of the first number. The Congregational General Conference of Massachusetts has passed a resolution recommending the use of unfermented wine at communion. The colored Roman Catholics of Washington have just completed a new church, which is larger and more beautiful than any other Catholic church in the national capital.

The Methodist mission in Mexico has been so successful that a number of Spanish publications are to be issued by the Book Concern in New York. An illustrated religious paper will also be issued in the Spanish language. The "Old Swedes Church" of Philadelphia recently celebrated its 176th anniversary. The Swedes came to what was afterward the colony of Pennsylvania in 1624, under the patronage of Gustavus Adolphus.

The Christian Statesman makes the extraordinary statement that the "friends of temperance in their zeal are in some places undermining the Sabbath. It has grown quite common in them to hold temperance meetings on that day. Such friends of a good cause in their mistaken zeal, pull down more than they build up."

The New York Observer pithily remarks: "The excessive use of jaw in religion is positively detrimental to growth in grace. The gospel of gush is not the gospel for the day."

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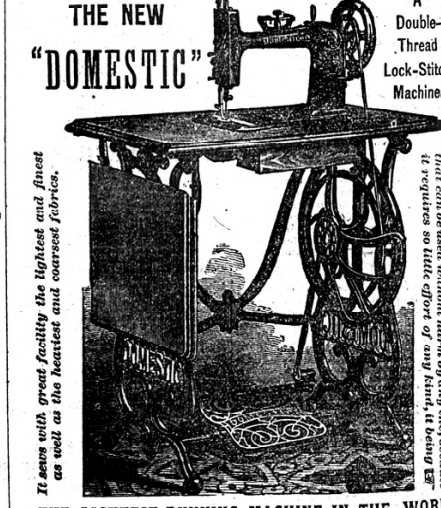
