CRICAGO, Jan. 18.—The Times' Wash ington special says Fernando Wood as-tonished the House yesterday by the ineduction of a resolution which calls for information as to officers of the United States army holding positions, civil and diplomatic; whether they are legally eligible and have conformed with the laws concerning civil offices and emoluments. This clause is supposed to refer to Gen. Adam Badeau, consul at London: Gen. Sickles, formerly at Madrid; Gen. Meigs, who is now traveling as a military observer, or comething of the sort, in Europe, at subject of the American circular note povernment expense. Information is also asked concerning officers who have been detailed from regiments to take positions near the person of the President; the terms of the resolution being everything to indicate Babcock, without naming him. When passed, the measdition to his rank of Colonel of Engineers. The Indian Bureau will be called on for explanations, as the committee seemed determined to thoroughly investigate this entire subject.

The House committee on naval affairs to-day authorized the chairman to appoint a sub-committee to investigate the affairs of the Navy Department, under the provision of Morrisson's resolution from committee on ways and

At a Pennsylvania Republican Association meeting last night a resolution was offered declaring Representative Blaine their choice for the Presidency, but in the opinion of the majority, it was too soon to agitate the subject. The resolution was laid on the table.

CHICAGO, Jan. 18 .- H. Davis, who shot and killed Chas Wyland last Thanksgiving day, came into the criminal court this morning and pleaded guilty of manslaughter and was sentenced by Judge Rogers to 21 years imprisonment in the penitentiary.


