The reason for this opposition is obvious:

The idea that the Clerk of a Court is any more of a party office than that of Cashier in a Bank or Book-keeper in commercial house, is not only degrading to the public service, but an insult to the Judiciary. It was this idea that made the Judiciary of the city of New York, under the government of the "Tammany Ring," the most disgusting feature of the Tweed scandal. Chief Justice Lewis, we can say, entertains no such degraded idea of his public functions. He suggested no such conditions to us, nor demanded anything more than a faithful discharge of the duties of the office which he conferred upon us, without any surrender of private rights or opinions. When our political views clash in such measure as to interrupt our confidential relations, then it will be our duty to tender our resignation; but it does not follow that while we hold the position we must surrender all personal rights to the dictation of party. We would accept no position of public trust on any such humiliating conditions. The "political precedent" of which our self-constituted censor has never heard, extends all through the Government, and especially through the Judiciary. The press of Brazil, entered the lower bay Supreme Court of the United States never changed its Clerk on party grounds. We have known many cases where the Court has appointed an ac tive political partisan of the opposition. Clerk, solely on the ground of fitness for the position; and among the thousands of Clerks in the Department at Washington, there are at least hundreds who have held their positions of trust under various Administrations, without ever having been called upon to surren, der any of their rights as American cit-

We acknowledge the right of the Administration to be served by its friends; while we assert the paramount right of the public to be well served. That is, in all matters of a political character, the officer should be in sympathy with the policy of the Administration which he represents. In matters merely cierical, involving no political responsibility. the only consideration should be, qualifications for the service demanded. That is the only rule by which the public can be well served, and official corruption, growing out of the system of party spoils, avoided.

But we are asked to define the principles upon which we dissolved our con nection with the Democratic party. Our space will only permit us to more briefly allude to these differences. We believed with General Jackson: "The Union, it must and shall be preserved.' In 1860, a very large slice of the Democratic party set up the doctrine that the States had a a right to secede from the union at will. We were left then with the section that supported Douglas upon the Jackson doctrine.

#### The Independent Press.

The salvation of this country is its independant press. In every instance, the investigations 1 ow going on in Congress, disclosing such an alarming degree of public and official corruption, have been instigated, and the main facts elicited, by the independent press. The investigating committees have derived all the information upon which they have acted from the detective force of the several leading newspapers: we believe these exposures would never have been made through any other source; the mere party press of the country has had no part or lot in the matter, and from the very nature of their several positions could not have had. Charges made by a party press against party opponents would have been met by denial and denunciation by the other party, and would have been regarded by the public as mere political inventions for party effect. Mark how soon the Clymer committee weakened, forthwith discharged the witness Marsh, and permitted him to leave the country, when it was discovered by the chairman that his friend Pendleton was mixed up in the affair and that the witness knew it. It was the New York Herald which has kept the committee up to its work, and prevented its shying when a Democratic coat tail was seen upon the trail they were following. It is the persistent efforts of the independent press which has forced the party politicians to accept the situation and join in the popular demand: "Let no guilty man escape."

The politician who imagines that either party will make any party capital out of these investigations is very much mistaken. It presents no issue between Republicans and Democrats, for members of both are involved in proportion to their opportunities, as they were in the "Credit Mobilier," the back-pay grab, the Washington ring swindles and even in the Tweed robbery. But it will result in the greater benefit of holding both parties to a stricter accountability for the character of the men they severally present for popular suffrage, and therein wil! the independent press again be a power in the land.

#### ANOTHER CHANCE FOR THE RAILROAD.

Company to invest \$60,000 in gold coin in stock of the company, upon condition that the citizens of Seattle will advance \$30,000 more upon the same terms. This would be sufficient to complete the first fifteen miles of the road without i suing any bonds or leaving a dollar of indebtedness upon the company. The great advantage of this plan over any other that has been practically suggested, will strike every intelligent ousiness man. With 15 miles of the road completed, the Company would be out of debt, with available assets of not less than \$200,000, and a net income from freight, at the lowest estimate, of \$60,000 a year-30 per cent. upon the capital. With this amount of assets and the results of the investment demon strated, they would establish a basis of credi! which would certainly command ontside capital, at low rates of interest, sufficient to continue the road until the whole line is completed; when, if they build the first section by the issue of bonds, they will have exhausted their credit upon its completion, without any thing upon which to guarantee a continuance of the work.

Nearly three years ago the propertyholders of Seattle guaranteed to the Northern Pacific R. R. Company as a condition for the location of the terminus of the road, as a bonus, \$50,000, three miles of water front on Duwamish Bay, with riparian rights; 4,800 feet of water front in the present business centre of the city; 750 town lots, with 3,000 acres of adjoining land, and \$200,-000 in city bonds; the whole estimated at the time at \$717,000. When the news was received that this offer was 1e jected and the terminus located at Taco

ma, we said to the people: "Seattle has lost nothing by this de-cision. The people have but to act promptly to secure more valuable and direct connections. With the capital direct connections. > WHITE AND BLACK SWANS .- Next to the peacock on the land, the swan is the most noble and elegant fowl on the water. The beautiful swan floats silently and majestically on the boson of the small pond or lake which adds so much to a domestic scene. Its handsome plumage of pure white, black legs feet, and bill; its beautiful curved neck and graceful movemnts, could not escape the notice of any one.

The antiquity of this stately bird, the "Sinent Swan," is conspicuous in the pages of history and poetry.
