

NEW YORK, July 27 .- A correspondent at Geneva gives an account this morning of a terrible storm which broke over that city, at midnight, Wednesday, the 7th inst. About 8 P. M., a few heavy drops of rain began to fall, and at the same time the whole circumference of the horizon became fitfully illuminated by flashes of sheet lightning but there was no thunder. Once only during the entire night was there one clasp of thunder, and that was when the storm was just over. The lightning gradually increased in intensity and became continuous.
