NEW ROUTES FOR THE WORLD'S COMMERCE A few days ago the telegraph announced that vessels had begun to pass through the Suez canal. The Red Sea is therefore loined with the Mediteranean, and a new route to India, shorter by many thousands of miles than that by the Cape of Good Hope, is open to the commercial nations of

Europe.

This work is another of the truly great This work is another of the truly great achievements of the present age. Its counterpart is already projected in the enterprise of a ship canal across the Isthmus of Darien. Now that the Sucz canal is so far completed as to admit of the passage of vessels through it, who will venture to assert that this other project is not equally feasible, and that it has not a prospect of

success?
The Sucz canal was constructed under the patronage of the Emperor of France. This magnate has been carrying out parts of a design conceived by the founder of his royal line. The expedition of Napolean into Exppt in 1798, was undertaken mainly for the purpose of effecting a lodgment on the farther shores of the Mediterranean, preparatory to his grand design of obtaining tall control of the East and pushing his conquests towards India. The idea of conquest has necessarily been abandoned; but France, by means of the great canal, is placed in a most favorable position with reference to the trade of the populous re-gions of Asia. The commerce of Asia and Europe will now take a new route. Mad ras, Bombny, Calcutta and the cities of China and Anstralasia, are brought nearer The change in th commerce must eventually prove of the greatest advantage to France. Her cities on the shores of the Mediterraneau will begin a new life. A very large share of the world's commerce will again, as in ancient times be wafted over that great sea, upon whose coasts, the Phaeniciaus, earliest nav oten. Greens have reported in the large strength of the streng nown. The growth of commerce will in-fuse new vigor into Smyrna and Constanti-nople.
