The Willamette must be cleared of all obstructions to navigation before Portland can claim the honors of a commercial The City Council has bid upon the city. work, which if accepted will enable us to commence work immediately upon Swan Island Bar, and deepen it sufficiently to accommodate vessels of a moderate draft.
