THE ENGLISH LANCUAGE.—The words of the English Language are a compound of several foreign lauguages. The English lan-guage may be looked upon saa compilation both in words and expressions, of various dialects. Their origin is from the Saxon language. Our laws were derived from the Norman, our military terms from the French, our scientific names from the Greeks, and our stock of nouns from the Latir, through the medium of the French. Almost all the werbs in the English language are taken from the German, and nearly every other dialect. The English language is composed of 15,734 words—of which 6,733 are from the Latto, 4,321 from the French, 1,665 from Saxon, 1,669 from the Greek,691 from from Saxon, 1,669 from the Greek,691 from Dutch, 211 from the German, (act inclading verbs,) 90 from the Welch, 75 from the Danish, 55 from the Spanish, 56 from the Icelandic, 31 from the Sweedish, 50 from the Gothic,61 from the Hebrew,15 from the Teutonic, and the remainder from the Arabic, Syriac, Turkish, Portugeese, Irish, Scotch and other languages.—Gal. Teacher.

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#### FOR DELEGATE TO CONGRESS, ALVAN FLANDERS. OF WALLA WALLA.

#### THE DISCUSSION.

The attendance on Thursday last to hear the two candidates for Congressional honors, was moderately good, considering the limited time of the publication of notice. Many in the country were not aware that it was to take place so early. The canvass has now fairly opened. The Hon. F. Clark who has seen proper to assume to himself the sobriquet of "Orphan Boy" took the lead. Much of his speech was made for buncombe It was very evident that the gentleman has an exceedingly high opinion of his own ability and power. He was exceedingly havish in his promises, and was besides very candid in declaring himself as not confining his electioneering operations to securing the Delegateship for the next two years, but that he calculated on being his own successor, for how long he did not say but the presumption is, from the amount of work be laid out and promised to accomplish, that he intends to hold the position during his national life. What say the Démocracy to such doctrine? They have always held to rotation in office unless our memory is very treacherous. What will Judge McFadden say to yielding his claims? Will the Democracy of King agree to this? If Frank attains his ends in this respect, and any important discoveries of minerals should be made within our bounds, would Frank leave even a speck for the county of King. No doubt he love King County, but his past conduct shows he loves Pierce more. We incline to the opinion however, that Frank would not find himself as omnipotent with the Fortieth Congress as he is, or has been, with a Washington Territory Legislature. Instead of being at the head, he might find himself at the tail, We purpose noticing hereafter his misrepresentations of the Civil Rights Bill, and the false deductions he made.

The Hon, Alvan Flanders succeeded him and replied to a portion of his sophistical arguments, then stated the ground upon which he stood, endoming the platform of the Union Party, and very briefly pointed-out what he understood to be the wants especially of this portion of the Territory. He did not however promise that he would secure them, but pledged himself to use his best endeavors to that end. Mr. Flanders is evidently a business man, and as such is chary of his promises, knowing it is easier to promise than to perform, and that a man who is good at making promises is very often good at nothing else. The impression made by him was most favorable. While he is no speaker, and makes no pretensions of that ch ra ter, he shows himself to be a man of good common sense, and of true business tact. Such a man could not fail itary escort. to make a good Delegate. His place is not so much upon the floor of Congress, as it is lu the Committee rooms and before the Departments. .Let the Union party do its duty in June at the ballot box, and Mr. Flunders will give a good account of himself at Washington.

Mr. Garfielde was limited to so short a time, as to have scarcely any opportunity to speak of the points now at issue between the parties. His remarks were therefore brief but felicitously to the point, and were listened to by the audience with marked

We know of but one man in the Territory who can offset this "orphan boy," and that is the distinguished and very influential Deputy United States Marshal, the Hon. Jared C. Brown. But Jured is, more modest. Jared does not stand up publicly and unblushingly speak his own praises. Jared has a sly way of doing these things by, writing editorials, and having others print them as their own. Take as an example the following which we elip from the Oregon Herald of April 20th

Chicago, May 1 .- The Working-men's emonstration to-day play ever witnessed in Chicago. The pro-cession was estimated at from 20,000 to 80,000. More than balf the shops of all kinds in the city are closed, the employers refusing to accede to the demands of the workmen. Whatever the ultimate result may be, it seems probable that the immediate effect of the law will be mischief and trouble between employers and laborers. Similar demonstrations occurred in most of the principal cities in the state.
