Latest by Telegraph.

EUROPEAN

LONDON, Jan. 20.—Cleopatra's obelisk passed through Margate this afternoon and is expected in the Thames at midnight.

Telegrams from Athens report that the insurrection in Thessaly is spreading. The insurgents, who fight under the Greek flag, and who have been joined by many Thessalonians residing in Greece, have been enthusiastically received in several districts. An insurrection has also broken out in Macedonia.

An official Turkish telegram, dated this morning, enlarges upon the means of defence still possessed by the Turks, and says Suleiman Pasha's army is concentrated at the Drama and South Adrianople railways. Later dispatches say nothing is known of Suleiman's whereabouts.

BELGRADE, Jan. 20.—The Servian government is summoning every available man to the army, with the purpose of occupying Prischinia and Novi Bazar. The Servians are converging in Novi Bazar.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 20.—Mukhtar Pasha has been appointed to the command along the line of defence before Constantinople.

The exit of refugees from Roumania is assuming colossal proportions.

Before leaving Adrianople the Turks burned their provisions and blew up the ammunition. The British Consul at Adrianople telegraphed this Sunday morning that a deputation of inhabitants had gone to meet the Russians. No news of the Russian entry has been received yet. A deputation has been asked an authorization for the British fleet to enter the Bosphorus.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—A Cabinet Council will be held to-day. Lord Derby is much better and will resume his duties immediately. A Russian official telegram, dated Kezanlik, Friday, states that the Turkish peace delegates arrived at Hermanli, Thursday, and were received with military honors, by order of the Grand Duke Nicholas. They started with an escort for Kezanlik, where they were expected on Saturday.

A correspondent at Pera telegraphs that the Russians have entered Adrianople.

DUBLIN, Jan. 21.—The funeral of the Fenian McCarthy took place to-day. It is estimated that 50,000 persons followed the remains to the cemetery. There were forty bands, and the procession was the largest since the death of Daniel O'Connell. The other Fenian convicts, recently released, were among the chief mourners.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—It is reported that the Chinese have captured the city of Kashgar.

In consequence of new instructions to plenipotentiaries, it is expected in Constantinople that the armistice will be signed immediately, perhaps on Monday. Preparations for the Sultan's removal to Russia are consequently suspended. A Paris correspondent also says Izzet Pasha's instructions convey to the plenipotentiaries full power and will inform that England is not likely to go to war.

EASTERN STATES.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—The Third Assistant Postmaster, Gen. Hazen, has prepared for consideration by Congress, a bill proposing an important change in the law relating to compensation of fourth class postmasters whose annual compensation is less than \$1,000. It provides that the basis of their compensation shall be the face value of stamps cancelled in their respective offices, instead of

the value of stamps sold by them. It also imposes severe penalties for making false returns and for trafficking in stamps. The present mode of adjusting salaries of Presidential postmasters will be left unchanged. The bill embodies recommendations from Postmaster General Key, in his last annual report, and will be by him transmitted to Congress at an early day.

The House committee on military affairs has a communication from Gen. Pope regarding army organization and so forth. He expresses the opinion that twenty five thousand men is too small a force for the needs of the country, and argues that the committee, in order to properly determine what form of staff organization and administration should provide for its thorough investigation by a board of officers of rank and distinction designated by an act of Congress. Gen. Pope holds that an army, no less than a form of government, must be suited to a people, or it is sure to prove both inefficient and unsatisfactory. To say that because a system of army organization and administration had worked well in Germany, France or elsewhere, where are such wide differences both in the character and habits of the people and the nature of military service to be performed, it should be adopted in this country, is no more sound than to say the same thing of politics.

THE STAR REVIVES

In pursuance of an arrangement secretly made between an apprentice in this office and a number of others, not residents of this place, but under the strongest conceivable obligations of good faith and fidelity to the publisher of this paper; all work on the STAR ceased just one month ago, while the publisher with his family was away from home for the holidays, and supposed the paper to be in the hands of its most true and trusted friends.

The local, "so long, boys," was the signal agreed upon, by which this friend informed his fellow conspirators, that he had obtained control of the office and secured the stoppage of the paper.

All work had ceased for nearly a week before any intimation of the plot was conveyed to the publisher. The first he knew of it was the shameless boast of one of the conspirators of their success, made to him while on his way home from the Skagit.

Financial matters had little or nothing to do with it, except that these plotters hoped to bring such a pressure to bear upon the creditors of the concern, that they would prevent its resumption. The paper itself, was more than self-supporting, from the start. Other matters had created an indebtedness which left the paper subject, in a certain degree, to the control of its creditors, provided they could be induced to take advantage of such treachery. Fortunately they could not be induced to do so.

The whole scheme was a carefully contrived plot to effect the financial ruin of the publisher, and use that as a means of breaking up his family and destroying his social happiness. As far as known, all the parties were professed friends, and did this work while making the strongest possible pledges of good faith and fidelity. This was the only opportunity that they were likely to secure to gratify their earnestly sought scheme of jealousy, personal hatred and revenge, which they so carefully covered up with professions of extra zeal and affectionate personal regard, until they were ready to strike.

The paper would have been resumed a couple of weeks ago, had it not been necessary to first secure it from all such covert foes. It is now on a firm basis, with little to fear from either secret or open enemies. It will probably be restored to its original size again when all these matters are fully settled. No pains will be spared to make it worthy of receiving a continuation of the liberal patronage heretofore extended to it.

Beside the traditional hay crop, so common on Snohomish ranches, he raises each year increased quantities of grain. Like other up river farmers, he says the bottoms are, if anything, too rich for grain; but after years of cropping they will be better for grain than now; as at present the straw is too tall and rank to be handled with ease.
