THE CONSTITUTION.

[Article XVI]

Sec. 5. All officers, now holding their offices under the authority of the United States or of the Territory of Washington, shall continue to hold and exercise their respective offices until they shall be superseded by the authority of the State, and shall be entitled to receive for services rendered the State, a compensation not greater than that therefore received. On the taking effect of this constitution, all officers thereby continued in offices, shall, before proceeding in the further discharge of their respective duties, take an oath or affirmation to support the constitution. All vacancies that may occur in existing offices prior to the election and qualification of officers under this constitution, shall be filled in the manner now prescribed by law.

Sec. 6. Whenever the judge of the Circuit Court of any circuit, elected or appointed under the provisions of this Constitution, shall have qualified in his office, the several cases then pending in the District Court of the Territory, within any county in such circuit, and the records, papers and proceedings of said District Court, and the seal and other property pertaining thereto, shall pass into the jurisdiction and possession of the Circuit Court of the State for such county; and until the District Court of the Territory shall be superseded in manner aforesaid, the said District Courts and Judges thereof, shall continue with the same jurisdiction and powers, to be exercised in the same judicial district re-

spectively, as heretofore constituted under the laws of the Territory. Whenever any two of the Judges of the Circuit Court, elected or appointed under the provisions of this constitution, shall have qualified in their office, the causes then pending in the Supreme Court of the Territory, and the papers, records and proceedings of said Court, and the seal and other property pertaining thereto, shall pass into the jurisdiction and possession of the Supreme Court of the State, and until superseded, the Supreme Court of the Territory, and the judges thereof, shall continue with like powers and jurisdiction as if this constitution had not been adopted.

Sec. 7. The terms of offices of the Governor and State officers, members of the Legislature, Circuit and Probate Judges, Circuit Attorneys, and all county officers first elected under this Constitution, shall commence on the seventh Monday after the first general election; and in the event that either of the persons elected shall fail to qualify within twenty days after said seventh Monday, then the person receiving the next highest number of votes for such office shall take it within the next succeeding ten days, and in the event of his failure or neglect, the office shall be declared vacant, and the Legislature shall provide for filling the vacancy.

Sec. 8. Until otherwise provided by law. The seals now in use in the Supreme, District and Probate Courts of the Territory, are hereby declared to be the seals of the Supreme, Circuit and Probate Courts respectively of the State. The seals of municipalities and all county officers of the Territory, shall be the seals of such municipalities and officers respectively under the State, until otherwise provided by law.

Sec. 9. When the State is admitted into union, the books, records, papers and proceedings of the Probate Court in each county, and all causes and matters of administration pending therein, shall pass into the jurisdiction and possession of the Probate Court of the same county created by this Constitution; and the said Court shall proceed to final judgment or decree, order or other determination in the said several matters and causes, as the Territorial Probate Courts might have done, if this Constitution had not been adopted. And until the election and qualification of the Probate Judges provided for in this constitution, the Territorial Probate Judges shall act as Judges of the Probate Courts created by this Constitution, within the respective county.

Sec. 10. The Legislature, at its first session, shall provide for the election of all officers whose election is not provided for elsewhere in this Constitution, and fix the time for commencement and duration of their terms.

Sec. 11. In case of election between candidates, at the first general election under this Constitution, for Judges of the Circuit and Probate Courts, or for Circuit Attorney, the evidence shall be taken in the manner prescribed by the Territorial laws, and the testimony so taken shall be certified to the Secretary of State; and said officer, together with the Governor and Treasurer of State, shall review the evidence, and determine who is entitled to the certificate of election.

Sec. 12. The County Auditor of the several counties shall provide poll-books, tally list and forms of oath of office for Inspectors, Judges and clerks of election for the first State election under this Constitution, for the several officers who are to be elected at such election, shall be canvassed, returns made, and results determined in the manner prescribed by the Territorial law for canvassing votes for like officers. The votes cast for Governor, State officers, members of the Legislature, Judges of the Circuit and Pro-

bate Courts and for Circuit Attorneys, shall be canvassed by the County Canvassing Board, in the manner prescribed by the Territorial law for canvassing votes for members of the Legislative Assembly; and returns shall be made to the Secretary of the Territory acting as Secretary of State, under the same regulations as are prescribed by law for sending the abstracts of votes for delegate in Congress; and the Secretary, Auditor and Treasurer or any two of them, on the twenty fifth day of their election, or within ten days thereafter, shall proceed to canvass the votes and declare the result. The judges and inspectors of election, who shall have been appointed by the County Commissioners of the several counties of the Territory, to hold and conduct the general election under this Constitution, shall be and are hereby appointed judges and inspectors of the first election, as provided in section 17 in this Schedule, with power to fill vacancies as provided by law.

Sec. 13. One Representative in the Congress of the United States shall be elected from the State at large, at the first election provided for in this Constitution; and thereafter at such times and places and in such manner as may be prescribed by law. When a new appointment shall be made by Congress the Legislature shall divide the State into Congressional Districts, in accordance with such apportionment. The vote cast for Representative in Congress, at the first election held under this Constitution, shall be canvassed, and the result determined in the manner provided by the laws of the Territory for the canvass of the vote for delegate in Congress.

DELEGATE TO CONGRESS.

More than usual interest centres in this office at the election. Should the proposed State Constitution be adopted by the people in November; yet if a man unfitted for the special work before him is elected Delegate, Congress would probably fail to recognize the work done here, or if admitted, would not give as favorable terms as otherwise might be secured, for the new State.

Another question at least equally important will be forced upon the people for their decision; that is, the line of conduct to be pursued in regard to railroad communication between Eastern and Western Washington. Probably there are none but who are in favor of direct railroad communication, and but few in this Territory but who wish the road or roads that may be the outlet of Eastern Washington to terminate on the Sound. To nearly all the people it matters little whether that terminus be Seattle, Tacoma or any other equally good harbor on the Sound. The thing that is essential is the securing railroad communication at the earliest practicable period, and permanently settling the status of all lands affected by the land grants, so that settlers can obtain a title to them, on which they can rely.

The Democratic Platform pledges their candidate unconditionally in favor of an extension of time to the N. P. R. R. The Republican convention will meet in a few days; great danger exists from the fact that the jealousy of Seattle towards Tacoma and the N. P. R. R. will cause them to work very hard to induce the convention to go to the other extreme and adopt a platform that will refuse any extension of time except upon such terms as would prevent the building of a road to the rival town of Tacoma, and compel that railroad in self-defense to be subject to the protecting control of the O. S. N. Co.

And Black and those working with him, are undoubtedly working in good faith to try and build a road as soon as

possible from New Tacoma directly over the mountains. A controlling interest of the company undoubtedly will favor him in this work, unless frightened from their position by the hostility of those who profess to represent Seattle interests in the Convention.

The Democratic platform of unqualified and unconditional support goes too far; while the position taken by Seattle politicians, that have controlled the actions of our Delegate for several years past have gone just as much too far the other way, and have proved subversive to the very interests they assumed to represent, and have kept almost one half of the lands of King, Whatcom and Snohomish counties as they could neither be settled upon as railroad nor as government lands, and have afforded the very pretext desired by the O. S. N. Co. in their efforts to control the actions of the N. P. R. R. Co. to their interests.

There is no hostility in the Territory to the Seattle and Walla Walla road. It will be built just as soon and be just as profitable, on the early completion of the N. P. R. R., as it that was never built. Petty jealousy will not hasten a single day the building of the Seattle and Walla Walla R. R.; yet this littleness has in the past four years compelled our Delegate to appear to be simply the mouth-piece of Seattle, rather than the representative of the whole Territory, and has prevented the settlement of questions that would have naturally settled themselves, and given us much greater wealth, population, and a more advanced social standing.

It is hoped the Republican convention will not adopt either extreme, but will favor the extension of time to the N. P. R. R. on such reasonable terms, as will aid those who like Col. Black are honestly and disinterestedly working for direct railroad communication between Puget Sound and Eastern Washington because they believe it best for the whole Territory as well as for the company.

If the proper man can be found to support this position in Eastern Washington, put him in the field; if not nominate from the Sound one whose record can stand on this platform, and this part of it will command the honest approval of nineteen twentieths of the people of this Territory.

Local Items.

The supplement furnished with this number, and that has been mailed to the readers of the STAR for some time past, will probably be discontinued in September. In place of it, will be furnished a genuine AUGUR from Portland, which will contain as much Oregon and telegraphic news as a Portland weekly and be mailed direct from that place to subscribers of the STAR.

Messrs. Packard and Jackson sometime since sought to remedy the deficient water supply of the flat around the school house at the eastern end of this town, by taking water from the creek west of Henry Jackson's residence and by means of an hydraulic ram forcing it up the hill to his door yard to a tank there made to hold it; from thence it can be taken in pipes all over that part of town. This improvement is now in successful operation, is of public interest, and will add to the value of property there.

No fresh developments from the Sultan river placer mines the past week. As it will be several weeks before any new cuttings will be tested, we have deferred a visit there until these tests shall be made, when a detailed description would be more valuable than now. A great number have gone up there this week. In the number are many from Seattle. No mining before this has been systematically attempted outside of the present bed of that river. Now the prospects are, to say the least, reasonably good for finding diggings where several hundred men could earn fair wages the year round.

Quite a strong desire has been expressed for the re-establishment of literary exercises by the Athenaeum, and for their regular maintenance at least as often as once in two weeks all winter. There is now full twice as many who could take part in keeping them up as there was at the time they were regularly maintained for a period of over two years. The hall can be made ready before many weeks if they can be started up if it is deemed desirable. Those wishing to help keep them up will confer a favor by informing the President or Secretary of the party they would take, or the amount of assistance they could render.

The hop last night at the hall was the event of the season. There were twenty couples present; among the number were several who came from Seattle on the steamer Paony Lake, including

Lieut. Chester from the revenue Cutter, Frank Mathews, the general favorite on such occasions, was down and played on the fiddle. All had a good time.

The rain this evening promises to be long enough to put out all the fires and do away with the smoke.

Last Thursday the Pill Chuck and Stillaguamish road survey party returned from their work, having finished the final location and survey of the road. A detailed account of their work will be given next week.

Territorial Items.

Judge Lewis is about to build a fine residence in Seattle.

Thomas Stratton has started a salt factory on Point Angelos spit.

Recently, in one week, Andrew Washburne of White river, lost by diphtheria, three children, aged nine, eleven, and thirteen respectively.

Hops are bringing a better price this year than formerly. It is hoped the hop raisers will now make up for their losses.

The King county fair commences at Yesler's Hall in Seattle, September 25th, and continues four days.

H. L. Blanchard in the Press, retracts the charges against Gov. Ferry and surrenders up letters etc. in his possession relating to the matter, in consideration of which the libel suit is dismissed. Verily the lions skin has come off.

N. T. Caton of Walla Walla is the Democratic nominee for Delegate to Congress; W. G. Langford for Pros. Attorney in the second district, and J. P. Judson in the first. No nomination was made for this district. It is to be next month at Seattle; chances favorable for the nomination of G. Morris Haller.

The viewers appointed by the King county commissioners to view out and locate a county road connecting Tolt settlement on the Snoqualmie with the settlements in Squak valley and at the Newcastle coal mines, have completed their work and made their report.

The Republican convention of King county nominated for the Council, G. S. Dudley; for Representatives, G. W. Tibbets, D. B. Ward and Ira Woodin; for Probate Judge, D. P. Jenkins; Auditor, L. B. Andrews; Sheriff, L. V. Wycoff; Treasurer, G. D. Hill; Assessor, E. Bryan; Superintendent of Schools, E. S. Ingraham; Surveyor, P. G. Eastwick; Wreckmaster, I. Waddle; Coroner, F. W. Sparling; County Commissioners, D. T. Denny, R. Stearns and Peter Saur.

Mr. Thos. Prosch has retired from the Pacific Tribune. His place will be occupied by Mr. E. A. Turner as editor and proprietor. This last gentleman has a local reputation about Seattle as a writer second to none. We welcome him back to his proper field of labor and trust his efforts may be rewarded with the most abundant success. Mr. P. is almost a life long printer who understands all the varied duties of his profession. He is an easy and graceful writer and will make his own position any where.

Harry Ireland, aged 12 years, son of D C Ireland, editor of Astorian, was kicked by a horse and killed Saturday last at Astoria.

The following census returns are obtained from the auditor's books: Total number of dwellings, 626; families, 624; white males, 1,660; females, 1,183; colored males, 79; colored females, 68; males foreign born, 237; females foreign born, 125. Besides these, it is estimated there are 150 Chinamen and 100 native Indians. Herald.

Democratic Territorial Platform.

1. That we are unalterably opposed to the dismemberment of the Territory; and are in favor of a State government at the earliest moment our population and wealth will justify the same.

2. That we are unqualifiedly in favor of the extension of time for the completion of the main line and branch of the Northern Pacific Railroad, and that we recognize as enemies of the prosperity of our people all who oppose such extension.

3. That the improvement of the Columbia, Snake and other great rivers of our Territory, emptying into the sea, are national works, which should be prosecuted to an early completion.

4. That we recognize the mutual dependence of labor and capital, and deprecate all attempts to antagonize them in the combination of capital to control and the strikes of labor to resist this control as destructive of the true interests.

5. That the present business depression and wide spread distress throughout the Union is chiefly attributable to unwise measures of finance for which the Republican party is wholly responsible.

6. That the policy of the government in relation to the Indian tribes on this coast, the experience of the past demonstrates to be a failure and a change therein is imperatively demanded; such an abandonment of the reservation system as will insure the breaking up of the tribal relations of the Indians, or a consolidation of all the reservations into one with military control, in order that annual raids of the hostile bands and the murder of our citizens may be effectually checked, the peace and prosperity of the Territory requires.

7. That the liberties of our nation rest in the intelligence of its citizens, and that our common school system cannot be overestimated, nor can too much care be bestowed to make it more liberal and perfect.

8. That our nation is to be congratulated that in none of the great sisterhood of the States, Federal bayonets are used to enforce the laws, but that all are once more moving along harmoniously under the government, established by the free suffrages of its people, and upheld by their patriotism, and devotion to liberty.
