### SOMETHING WORTH THINKING

#### ABOUT.

A few days since, M. W. Packard, the enterprising merchant of this place, handed us a copy of the St. Lawrence county *Republican*, a large weekly paper, published at Ogdensburg, St. Lawrence Co. New York, and the official paper of that Co., with a weekly circulation of 4,500 copies. Mr. P. is a native of that county, and the statistics given below refers to matters almost within his personal knowledge, as he paid a visit to his old home a couple years ago. Although Ogdensburg is the chief business centre of that county, Canton, situated back from the St. Lawrence river is the county seat, and it is of this section, that reference is to be made.

An article in that paper enumerates the cheese factories around Canton, which have all grown up there since Mr. P. was a young man of that place. The writer of that article visited the 12 factories, found within a radius of five miles around Canton. The whole article is too long to copy. The following is given:

"A visit to the cheese factories in this town shows it to be, in quantity of cheese made, probably the busier town in the county, and possibly in the state. There are twelve cheese factories with a patronage of 5,450 cows. In the best of the season they received 113,098 lbs. of milk daily, making just two hundred cheese weighing from 52 to 68 lbs. apiece, or averaging 60 1/2 lbs. Then the whole number of cows gave on an average 20 1/2 lbs. per cow, per day. It took 9 1/2 lbs. of milk for 1 lb. of cheese. The shrinkage to date has brought the daily amount of milk to 77,627 lbs., and the number of cheese to 128. Now the whole number of cows average each per day close to 14 1/2 lbs. It takes now on an average 10.02 lbs. of milk for 1 lb. of cheese, showing that the milk is decidedly of a poorer quality, it taking over two thirds of a pound of milk more for a pound of cheese. This is a great shrinkage for this time in the year, and is a fair guide to estimate the whole county with her hundred factories or more. With an early start, a smart horse, and short staries, one can start from the South Canton factory and make the tour in one day."

At first thought it seems impossible that the time should ever come, when within five miles of Snohomish city a dozen cheese factories could be counted, that would have a patronage of over 5,000 cows, yet it is not only possible, but entirely feasible and could be accomplished within 20 years by less than one dozen men who each had \$10,000 capital and reasonable experience and business enterprise to put into the business. This great business has not been a greater time growing up there. There is here better soil, better climate, better market, every thing would be in favor of its success. To be sure it will take a few years to clear up and improve some of the large marshes, to get a stock of good cows and train a good class of milkers, who would not demand wages larger than could be given in such a business. Should farmers turn their attention that way, and leave for fruit and vegetables all the land best fitted for those crops, and only take that land on which the dairy business would pay best of any farm business and leave all the tide marsh farms for grain, there would be enough land better suited for dairy farming than any thing else; in Whatcom, Snohomish and King counties to support at least the following amount of cows in connection with cheese factories.

Nootsack valley	30,000 cows.
Samish "	15,000 "
Skagit "	50,000 "
Stillaguamish "	20,000 "
Snohomish "	40,000 "
Squak & Cedar "	10,000 "
White River "	35,000 "
Stueck "	5,000 "

Any one thoroughly conversant with the resources of these regions, who understood the dairy business, would say that the above would be below, rather than above what could be supported in the above named sections; yet the aggregate is astonishing, as it shows where over 200,000 cows, in these three counties could be kept wholly for the cheese making business.

The market is world wide, the price to be realized by these first in the business is really extravagant; water, feed, climate and means of marketing all that could be desired. In these estimates the tide land in these three counties are not included, they would alone, if all in grain, furnish 5,900,300 bushels annually for exportation.

Twenty-five men, working together to make the natural wealth of these three counties, known, to induce men to settle, and improve these great natural advantages, could in 20 years cause the realization of so dazzling a picture.

Is it not truly something worth pondering over? Is it not truly a problem worthy of every possible effort to solve? Especially when nine tenths of the best quality of agricultural land from this valley north to British Columbia, lies vacant, awaiting the coming of the settler who will subdue it, and improve the advantages nature offers to the hardy, the brave and the industrious.

### THE CANDIDATES FOR OFFICE.

[Continued from last week.]

In last number, the leading Territorial and county candidates were noticed.

There is left to be noticed in this issue the candidates for Treasurer, Probate Judge, County Commissioners, School Superintendent, Coroner, and County Surveyor.

#### COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

The regular Republican candidates are J. H. Irvine, W. H. Ward and Chas. Stackpole. The Democratic are Chas. Harriman, John Davis and J. H. Hancock.

The Independent are Thos. Ovensell and John McDonald. It is not known that the two last are making any effort for their election, but as their names appear on the printed ballots, they are included in the list.

Messrs Hancock, Irvine, McDonald and Ovensell are all well to do farmers, who have resided a long time on the Stillaguamish, are well acquainted with the interests of the County, and it is presumed they would satisfactorily fill the office, if any of the number were elected. Two years ago, Irvine and Hancock were opposing candidates. Mr. Irvine was elected. Mr. Irvine has performed the duties of his office to the full satisfaction of his own party, and in as good a manner as any member of the present board. He has a fair chance for re-election. In Snohomish precinct reside two candidates, W. H. Ward and John Davis. Both are public spirited men, well informed, and would make good officers. Mr. Ward has been one of the leading spirits in building up the Athenaeum. On the abandonment of the Auditor's office by David Sheridan, he was appointed county Auditor. He is too well known to need further notice. The following is a sketch of Mr. Davis history: John Davis, was born in 1833 in Brown Co. Ill. emigrated to Iowa in 1839, came to this Territory in 1855, Soldier of Indian war, soon after arrival in the Territory; was in the party, commanded by Maj. Haller, as a volunteer, on his second expedition to the Simcoe valley in Nov. 1873. Resided in Walla Walla in 1859 and 1860, moved to Yakima valley in 1865, in 1869, settled in Squak valley, and settled on this river in 1872. Was married in Oregon 1857. Lives 3 miles up the river. Always a farmer.

Chas. Stackpole and Chas. Harriman are the opposing candidates from Qualeo precinct. Mr. Harriman has been so many times a commissioner that his qualifications are well known. Mr. Stackpole has never before, we believe, been a candidate for a county office, although well educated and an old settler in this county. His reputation as a good citizen and a man of good judgment is such that he will command the full vote of his party in this election.

#### COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

For this office there is but one candidate, the Rev. T. W. McCoy, the Presbyterian minister of this place. As his name is on both tickets it is presumed he is the best man for the place. He undoubtedly is well fitted for the position as far as scholarship is concerned.

#### PROBATE JUDGE.

For this important office, the candidates are Judge Haskell, the Republican candidate, who has been Probate Judge

of this county for six years past, and whose long term of office presupposes the requisite qualifications to perform its varied and important duties, and Edward Holland Nicoll, the Democratic candidate, a comparative newcomer in the county, but a man of culture and travel, who has read much and seen a great deal of the world, a lawyer by profession, and one who should be well qualified for the office. The race will be close between them.

#### COUNTY TREASURER.

The man who keeps the money of the county should be both trustworthy and responsible. E. C. Ferguson, on the Republican ticket is thoroughly known to all as the leading merchant and business man of the county, who has rarely passed a season in the past 18 years without holding some responsible office. Mr. Willour, the courteous and obliging druggist is a business man thoroughly qualified to take charge of any business that may be entrusted to him, being prompt and obliging, and faithful to any trust committed to his care. The county funds will be safe in his hands, and his present business, keeping him close to his store during all business hours, it would be more for the public convenience to have him elected to that office than his opponent, whose business calls him away from his store a great part of the time, when these official duties would necessarily be entrusted to less responsible subordinates.

#### COUNTY SURVEYOR.

W. H. Brown, is the candidate of both parties for this office. He is considered to be in every way well qualified for the business.

#### CORONER.

Dr. Taggart, the Democratic candidate is a regular practicing physician in this town, a gentleman and a scholar, a Republican in politics, but probably well qualified for the office. In fact, the two regular county tickets are perhaps the best, taken as a whole of any tickets ever put forth in the county. The public business will be properly done, whoever is elected. The canvass is very close in many cases, but exceptionally fair and honorable. It has been unnecessary for us to criticise or find fault with the record of any now in the field, nor have we aimed to display to any great extent our own personal preferences. But we will say, that the nomination of Henry Oliver for that office on the Republican ticket; who for a long time has been a Justice of the peace, at Stanwood, in Centreville precinct, on the Stillaguamish, is so very appropriate in every respect, that a due regard for our representative position as a public journalist, compels us to throw off our habitual reserve, and earnestly entreat all of our personal friends to vote for our father in law for that very necessary office; because, if current reports are reliable, there is a greater apparent need of a Coroner residing in that section of the county, than elsewhere, and the old man evidently expects some office, and this will gratify his vanity as well as a more important office.

The man was found, with a bullet hole in his head, in the stable near the cow, which it is supposed he was preparing to milk. The ball was fired by some person, unknown, and striking him in the neck just below the ear, and extending upwards into his head; the hole made by the bullet is quite large. The woman was lying on the ground just outside the house, and as blood was discovered on the floor, it is conjectured that she was shot in the house and started to run to her husband at the barn, when she was overtaken by the assassin, who cut her throat from ear to ear. Two small children were found in the house—the elder about two and one half years and the other six months. They had been about thirty-six hours without food. Nothing seemed to be disturbed about the premises, and it cannot be imagined what prompted the murder. The victim was an inoffensive man. He was about forty and his wife about thirty five.
