THE RUSH COMING.

Hundreds of Men Heading Toward the Mines.

Last Week Mr. S. E. Child, who makes Spokane Falls his home, arrived in the city direct from Eagle City, the inhabited centre of the Ceur d'Alene mines, with the intention of rusticating for a month at least.

Mr. Child has a store in the mines, and during his absence the establishment is managed by his son. He naturally supposed, considering the difficulties to be surmounted in order to get into the mines, that common sense would teach the majority of fortune hunters the absurdity of rushing into a snow bound camp where there was no hope of working the ground, and thought that the business of his mercantile establishment would move along under the supervision of his son without any great tax on that gentleman.

Imagine his surprise when he received a letter Sunday from his representative in the mines requesting his immediate presence, and stating the fact that prospectors were crowding in at such a rate that one man was unable to meet the demands of the rapidly increasing business.

The letter conveyed the information that the head and front of the anticipated rush was being felt. From every point on the line of the rail road from whence the mines could be reached a continual stream of fortune hunters were making their respective camps. Scores of men were coming in every day, the number increasing with the approach of spring, slow as that approach might seem.

Mr. Child had his visit here cut short off. He immediately secured six pack animals and departed Monday for the camp. He carried such goods as tents, sheet iron stoves, lamps and those articles mostly in demand in the diggings. We met him just before he started on the trip.

He informed us that there was many things that might take in that would pay him for the expense of freighting, some 40 cents per pound, but no line of articles so much in demand as those enumerated.
