CITY COUNCIL. The regular monthly meeting of the City Council of the City of Spokane was held Monday evening, March 8, 1884.

Under unfinished business the request of Mr. Burch for assistance in paying for the Post street bridge was taken up.

On motion the report was referred to a committee of two composed of Dr. B. F. Burch and W. C. Gray.

Under a suspension of the regular order of business the electric light question came to the surface.

A petition and ordinance from Geo. Brandt and associates, represented the Edison light and asking for a franchise to erect suitable machinery for supporting Spokane Falls with electric light.

City Attorney Hyde read the following ordinance setting forth the wishes, promises and desires of the U. S. Company, which on motion of Dr. Gandy, was adopted.

An Ordinance granting to the United States Electric Company, their associates and assigns, the right to erect, construct and maintain electric light works in the city of Spokane Falls.

SEC. I. That the United States Electric Company, their associates and assigns, be and are hereby granted the right, privilege and authority to locate, place, maintain and use in the streets, alleys, avenues, highways and public grounds within the corporate limits of the city of Spokane Falls in this territory, Washington Territory, poles, fixtures and apparatus, and thereon to fasten wires, and to run and use overhead wires, and to run and use overhead wires, and to run and use overhead wires.

SEC. II. That the said poles, fixtures and apparatus shall be constructed and erected in a safe and workmanlike manner, and located in or near a street, alley, avenue, highway or public ground, and the poles shall be placed in a safe and workmanlike manner, and located in or near a street, alley, avenue, highway or public ground.

The outfit belonged to a man named Elders, who has a contract for packing goods into the mines from Post Coeur d'Alene for a merchant named Fineberg, who represents a large company in San Francisco. Besides these thousands of dollar's worth of goods go out of the city by every imaginable conveyance, weekly, and the throng of strangers on the streets is an indication of the greatly increased travel. The rush is unprecedented in the history of the country, and the present travel is but the beginning of the flood, and the question is how many will be laid on to fortune.
