OFFICIAL orders have been received from Washington to remove the Land Office from Colfax to Spokane Falls, and that will be done as soon as the business of the office can be so arranged. Pretty tough; don't you think so, Kel?

THE Sprague Herald reaches us enlarged to a seven column sheet, and shows more than ever that its proprietor is alive to the interests of his own town. We wish our neighbor the best of good luck, and the people should show their appreciation of his enterprise by supporting him liberally.

By the Wednesday number of the Chronicle we too announced that H. E. Woodley, late of the Okadale (Cal.) Wheat-grower, has been taken in as associate business manager. Our acquaintance with Mr. Woodley extends over several years and we know him to be a wide awake newspaper man and a good writer. May he like our city well enough to remain for good.

In commenting upon the removal of the Land Office to Spokane Falls, the Cheney Sentinel treats the question in a far more liberal and calm manner than was evinced by the howlings of its contemporary, and, we are pleased to state, shows no disposition to attack a neighboring town just because it happened to secure something that both places were striving for. In this style of criticism should be strictly adhered to there would be no occasion nor excuse for bickerings.

THE Cheney Tribune goes after the scalps of the Spokane Falls "papers" for charging the county officials with neglect of duty in allowing the prisoners to make their escape from the county jail. Now, Kellogg, we have sins of commission enough to suffer for without being saddled with those we have not been guilty of committing. Had we believed that the officers had been derelict in their duties we would most assuredly have said so, but being ignorant on the subject we charitably refrained from pitching into them. Just be a little careful in your charges hereafter, my friend.

THE impression is going out in some quarters that the railroad was instrumental in securing the removal of the land office to this city, and efforts are being made to create a hostility toward the road. As far as we know the railroad company is not to be charged with the sole responsibility of the change. It may have aided through its agents that Spokane Falls was the most desirable point, all things considered, of any place on the line. Yet, who can blame the company for that? Take ten thousand disinterested people from any state in the Union and permit them to personally inspect the towns in this district and choose the one they considered the most fitting for the land office, and we would be willing to wager our print shop that nine thousand nine hundred and ninety-nine would favor Spokane Falls, and the one thousandth would either be blind or an idiot.

SPOKANE FALLS is settling her traps for another smart game. In a few weeks parties will go stealthily around the country with perfidious prayers for a division of territory so as to make Spokane Falls the county seat. The petition peddlers will solemnly promise each locality that if they will only "stand in" they shall be the county seat of another county. The Tribune gives the warning let the farmers and others who have to foot the bills for all these county seats be on their guard and not be deceived. Remember that divisions of counties make much heavier taxes.—Cheney Tribune.

Blinded by envy, maddened by the bright prospects surrounding Spokane Falls, and seeing its own town slowly and surely going to decay, the Cheney Tribune raves like a spoiled child. Nothing is too mean for it to say against our people and the city, and not be satisfied with distorting facts. It resorts to the most willful misrepresentations. The above article is a sample of the pabulum that it deals out to its readers. It endeavors to convey the impression that the saintly Tribune has put on its armor of conscientiousness to do battle for the welfare of the poor, defenseless people. It desires to appear as the champion of men, the defender of the people's rights. "Oh! what a goodly undeveloped falsehood!" We are not cognizant of any such proceeding on the part of the people of the Falls, and do not believe that the idea has been entertained by our citizens. It is the ghost of Hengro that is frightening the editor of that sheet. It fears that the time is not far distant when Cheney will lose the county seat that it obtained through disreputable means, and the mere thought causes him to lose his equilibrium. We were in hopes that this silly contention would have been allowed to die out. The Tribune only feeds the sore, where it should be bringing the plaster. Spokane Falls recognizes no rival in Cheney, or for that matter, in any city in western Washington. All the opposition that comes from such puny sources will not effect its growth one iota. Our citizens

are willing that the truth be told of the town at all times, and they court the closest scrutiny of its resources. It has been attacked time and again from this same quarter, and all the anathemas heaped upon it have redounded upon the heads of the aggressors. It may be in very bad taste for us to notice these vicious assaults, yet it is impossible to remain silent and see the men abused who have extended generous support to those who are applying the castigation.

LOCAL.

New Establishment.

By a card elsewhere in this issue it will be seen that Geo. T. Crane & Co., intend to open out in Dr. Burch's new brick on Howard street, about the 1st of October, one of the most complete stocks of hardware, stoves and tinware ever brought into the territory. Mr. Crane has been engaged in the trade for years and knows every phase of the business. He is full of vim and push and being so situated as to handle plenty of capital is prepared to do just what he says he will. He will purchase his goods direct from the Eastern manufacturers, and proposes to sell close down to the bottom. He will be prepared to supply dealers in this country at jobber's prices, and they will save money by patronizing this new firm. Mr. Crane has made all his arrangements here and has returned East where he will probably have the stock that will be on hand at the date given.

A Casualty.

Wednesday, about noon, a Mr. Wood, claiming to be the pioneer photographer of Walla Walla, met with quite a painful accident just as he was entering the city from the north. He was sitting on the front seat of his wagon, with one foot on the break, when the front wheel dropped into a slight excavation and he was thrown violently to the ground, his forehead coming in contact with a rock. He sustained a very severe cut and abrasion some three inches in length over the right eye, a large piece of the detached flesh hanging over the eye. Drs. Jas. Whelan and G. S. Allison were summoned to attend the injured man. These skillful practitioners held it necessary to take up several stitches in order to bring the mangled flesh together. Wood suffered no great inconvenience from the injury apparently, as he moved on with his vehicle Thursday. The wound is not dangerous if Wood takes care of himself.

Vocal Item.

Maybe our readers are not aware that there exists in this city a German organization of vocalists, and good ones, too, that meet regularly, has its rules, regulations and officers. It is so, however, and their performances with the mouth are more than ordinarily good. The society is known as the "Spokane Falls Chorale," with Peter Deuber, President, G. Palmer, Vice-President, H. Priesse, Secretary, and G. Roos, Treasurer. There are a large number of members, almost all of whom have well trained voices. The society meets once or twice a week, and have secured Cannon's Hall, and we might add a room better adapted to the purpose than can be found in the city. The members gathered together Tuesday evening and passed several hours pleasantly together. It proves a source of a great deal of pleasure and instruction to the gentlemen who constitute the organization, especially during the long winters, when the sun gets up so late that they hardly have a chance to look around before it is time to go down again.

Excavating Mines.

It is evident from the nature and extent of the mineral discoveries being made throughout the northwest that the time is not far distant when Spokane Falls will be in the midst and the distributing point to one of the richest and most extensive fields of mining operations in America. The mountains in this section, where the precious metals seem to abound are spurs of that grand unbroken chain that extends from Alaska to Patagonia, in which, at various points along its length, have gold and silver been found in greater or less quantities. On account of the newness of the country and the limited resources it is only a matter of conjecture as to what nature of these mountains is metal producing. yet it is safe to say that many a rich vein is hidden away awaiting the lucky prospector. From the fact that ledges of ore have been uncovered at various points separated miles from each other, it is but natural to suppose that there exists plenty more that will be discovered and worked at an early day. The strikes already made are entirely undeveloped, and it is impossible to say just yet what the ultimate result of the present excitement will amount to, although if the specimens that have been taken from the surface improves as shafts are sunk, it is no exaggeration to promise that Washington territory will take its place among the leading precious metal producing states and territories of the Union. The mines now being partially worked between this city and Colville, only some three or four miles distant, have produced some rich looking ore that is being tested and which will be reported as soon as returns are received. New claims are being staked out in that locality almost every day. The Okanogan mineral belt, still further away, is attracting many prospectors, but as yet no extensive work has been accomplished, although preparations are in progress to push operations. The silver lode discovered near Fort Spokane, fifty miles west of this city, shows very flattering prospects. There are five claims located on this lode. R. H. Hargrove and Frank R. Moore & Co.

of this city, Jas. B. Monahan, Gen. Miles and a Mr. Davis each have claims 600 by 1,500 feet in extent. During Mr. Kaiser's recent visit to Portland he had a specimen of the rock taken from Mr. Hargrove's claim assayed, and it proves to contain \$88.74 in silver to the ton, with traces of gold. These specimens were merely the surface croppings, and indicate the existence of a rich vein further down. The assay was made from specimens taken at random, and is considered a remarkably good showing. Mr. Hargrove is more than satisfied with the report and feeling that he has a "big thing" goes to work next week to sink a shaft. He has named his mine the "Last Chance," and we hope it may become one of the famous mines of future history. The other parties holding claims propose to go to work on them soon, the assay making them up to the importance of the rock. These claims are situated within a short distance of the Spokane river, near where it enters the Columbia. Fuel and water exists near at hand in abundant quantities, and before long will be experienced in working the ore. From present indications it is evident that the owners of these claims have a big bonanza, and we anxiously await further developments.

BROWNE'S ADDITION

to the
CITY OF SPOKANE FALLS

The original plots of cities, as a rule, only embrace a small square of real estate, and if there is any attraction in its location to induce immigration, and the spot chosen for a city justifies people in building, it is not a great while until the plot is all occupied and buildings spread out on adjoining land, which in time is laid out in lots and blocks, with the necessary dividing streets and alleys, and goes on record as John Doe's or Richard Roe's addition to the town or city. This piling addition upon addition goes on just as long as the nature of the case and the developing capacity of a place will stand, and before long the "original plot" is lost among so many and superior surrounding additions. The city of Spokane Falls is no exception to the rule. In every point of the compass, near and far, have additions bearing the names of the owners of the property, been attached to the city until the limits stretch in every direction. These additions have grown out of a necessity for building room, and we do not doubt but that in a very few years the metes and bounds as now existing will be too cramped for our rapidly growing population. The almost unprecedented growth of Spokane Falls is the primary cause of this multiplicity of additions, and the demand for lots has not decreased a particle with the increase of building sites. Among our early residents who succeeded in securing large pieces of property in, and adjoining, town is J. J. Browne, Esq. The bulk of his property, forming a triangle of high land formed by the Spokane river and Hangman creek, adjoining the city to the west, and by long odds contains the best situated and most desirable building lots south of the river. For some time it has been Mr. Browne's intention to have this property subdivided into lots and blocks, as "Browne's addition," and he has been busy for some time past in securing the lots, and he has just completed a handsome plan of the addition, and Mr. Browne is kept busy selling these lots, the demand for which "surpasses all understanding." For beauty of location, for healthfulness, for attractiveness of surroundings and for the nature of the land, we feel safe in saying that this property stands alone and preeminently far ahead of any that has yet been surveyed about the city. The land consists of some 120 acres, including broad streets, parks, etc. It is almost perfectly level, rising from the flat plain that constitutes the western part of the city with an imperceptible slope to the bank of Hangman creek canyon. The east front is open, but the entire western part is covered with a fine open forest of pines. It is bordered on the north by the Spokane river, and on the west by Hangman creek. The land is entirely free of rocks, and there is not a single lot that will not make a good building site. In buying out the addition Mr. Browne has, with excellent taste, provided for wide streets, running north and south, east and west. Traversing the plot from east to west is Pacific avenue, a highway 100 feet wide, that is a continuation of First street, and terminates at the edge of the bluff to the west, connecting with Cour d'Alene avenue. Skirting the land to the north is Riverside avenue, which in time is to be one of the most attractive avenues in the territory. This driveway is a part of the grand boulevard now under contemplation, which starts from the center of the city and following the sinuous course of the river extends to the extreme northwestern terminus of Mr. Browne's property, diverging from that point to the south enters Cour d'Alene avenue, the street skirting this new addition to the west, and from there into Cliff avenue and on around the south part of the city. Mr. Browne already has a force of men grading the road and putting it in splendid traveling condition. He has also set aside a large tract containing several acres upon which he proposes next summer to build an elegant house. No expense is to be spared in laying out the grounds, and in his own words, he intends to have a residence and surroundings equal to anything in the territory. As he has the means, and

is in earnest, we believe he will carry out the project. In the southern part of the addition, in conjunction with A. M. Cannon, Mr. Browne will lay out a public park containing fifteen acres. This will be enclosed, laid out with walks, pavilion, etc., and will fill a want perceptibly felt by the community. As soon as the water works are established here Mr. Browne will have the pipes laid throughout the addition, insuring every resident an abundant supply of water. With the exception of the southern tier of blocks, only a fraction of the land, there is not a spot in the addition but from which one can have a glimpse of the falls, and a view unsurpassable for picturesque-ness. The elevation, while no higher than at the depot at the most elevated point, seems to tower away above the plains on the opposite side of the river. Standing on Pacific avenue one can see, a half mile away, the white-crested falls leaping and bounding down the face of the rocks, weaving a veil of mist above which, resting like a halo, is arched a delicately tinted rainbow. We believe one of the most striking views of the falls can be had from this point. Spread out to the east, near at hand, like a panoramic vision, are the checkerboard buildings of the city, the sun reflecting from the white and red walls and new roofs, while piercing the ether above the highest houses are the chimneys and the cupolas of private and public edifices, the whole effect heightened by a background of pine-clad mountains that seem cut like a cameo from the deep blue horizon. To the north, just at your feet, the clear waters of the Spokane sparkle in the light as it rushes madly by, while a broad plateau, arising high above the river, spreads out until the yellow grass is mingled with the dark forests that join and climb over the range of mountains in that direction. To the west the addition terminates with an abrupt cliff, the precipitous side of which is washed by Hangman creek, two hundred feet or more below. The canyon, as viewed from this elevation, presents many marked points to call forth the admiration of the beholder, and from the bald, rough-faced palisades to the gentle rippling brook, one can find something new to dwell upon at every turn. Situated as it is this property finds a ready sale in the market, and no sooner was it known that the addition had been laid off than the demand for lots was simply tremendous. A large number have already been disposed of, and those who contemplate investing in city property should see the owner immediately in order to secure a good lot, although there is very little choice. The prices at present are very low, and lots that can now be purchased for a few hundred dollars will be worth double the price within a few months. We understand that many of those who have invested propose to commence building at an early day.
