The wheat market is so much unsettled that the Cheney dealers have ceased buying for cash, and we understand, Spokane dealers also. The fact is the market does not warrant paying as much as the farmers demand, the crop is generally better than was expected before harvest, and indications are that the market will drop and not rise again before winter or spring, if it does then. When the market settles down, our dealers will again buy at the highest market price.—Cheney Tribune.

The above may be all right as far as it refers to Cheney, but does not fit the dealers at the Falls. Buyers here are taking all the grain that comes in market, and are paying cash for it. Wagon loads with wheat arrive daily, and there is a great deal yet to come. Buyers may be getting cinched on the investment, yet they look pleasant under the affliction.

So far as at present heard from, the hurricane from the West Indies which has been passing northward along the coast, has not been specially disastrous to shipping. This is no doubt largely due to the fact that vessels about to sail had timely warning of its approach. One or two steamships are missing, but will probably soon be heard from, and few vessels have been driven ashore, the nearest mishap of this kind being at Freeport, L. I., where the Italian steamship Independent ran ashore Thursday morning in a fog and high sea, and was promptly abandoned by her crew without loss of life.

When that section of the Villard party containing the representatives of the eastern and foreign newspapers were on the eve of leaving Portland an outline of their trip was published, and it was therein stated that the train upon which they were traveling would reach Cheney at 6 o'clock, Sunday morning, remain there a couple of hours, arrive at Spokane Falls at 10 A. M., and remain until 6 P. M. This statement was received by the majority of our people as one of the humorous productions of the witty Indians, who ever he may be, who had laid out the arrangements for the entire excursion west of the Rocky Mountains, and therefore there was not a single person in waiting at the depot at the hour set down Sunday morning. The train was not expected to be on time, even if ever so much desired, and there was no inquiry set on foot until noon at least. We do not know at what hour the quill scribes reached Cheney, nor how long they remained there, nor do we know, however, that the train hauled up at this depot at a few minutes past 5 in the evening. A large crowd had collected at that hour to gaze upon the representative newspaper men, but had but little opportunity to satisfy their curiosity, as, on account of the lateness of the hour, the travelers were hustled into carriages and immediately driven about the city and falls. The smoke seemed to grow more dense Sunday afternoon than at any previous time, and that together with the gathering shades of night, so obstructed the view that the visitors were not able to see a great deal of the place. The artist with the party made a sketch of the lower falls, but on account of the darkness was unable to make one of the upper extract. The gentleman spoke in the highest terms of the beauty of the falls, the extent and excellence of the water power, the handsome appearance of the city, the wonderful signs of prosperity and growth and the bright future in store for Spokane Falls. The party was driven to the train for supper and remained here until 8 o'clock. 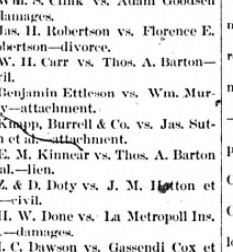

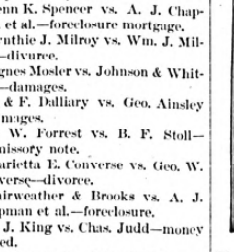

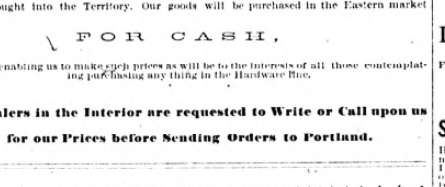
