Four Men Drowned.

[Walla Walla Statesman.]
Friday morning Wm. E. Holmes, of Portland, Henry Taylor, John P. Davies and a Russian Finn whose name is unknown, were drowned in Granite Point rapids, about six miles below Alnuta, W. T. Mr. Holmes and Capt. E. Spencer had just completed a contract with the government to remove rock obstructions from the channel at these rapids, and nothing remained to be done except to house the plant and gather up the tools. The first news of the lamentable accident reached Portland in a private telegram to Mr. F. C. Goodin, bookkeeper of the Oregonian, from Capt. Spencer, who requested that the news be broken as gently as possible to Mr. Holmes' wife. Answering the Oregonian's telegraphic request, Mr. T. J. Penabody, agent for the O. R. & N. Co., at Riparia, wired the following particulars of the terrible occurrence:
Mr. Holmes had his rock saw moored out in Granite Point rapids and the current took his men were pulling out in a large skiff from the shore to the saw. There was a breast line leading from the saw to the shore and the skiff drifted down and struck this line broadside, which capsize the skiff instantly and the men were all drowned. One of them swam and the current took him down the river 300 feet, when he sank. None of the others were seen after the boat capsized. A farmer named O'Dell, living there, witnessed the whole occurrence. None of the bodies have been recovered.
As all steamboat men familiar with Granite Point rapids are aware, the water is deep, almost icy cold at all seasons, and full of whirlpools. The man swimming was probably Taylor, a very powerful man, who used to be perfectly at home in the water. Taylor and Davies were experienced men in rock work, and had been employed on the government work at Yaquina bay until three months ago, when they went to Snake river. Taylor was a native of England, aged 35, and unmarried. Davies was a native of Wales, aged 21 years. All work of the character undertaken by Mr. Holmes is attended with danger, and many lives have been lost in the rapid waters of the Columbia and Snake rivers since immigration began, but it is particularly distressing that four lives should have been lost just when the dangerous work was practically completed.
An Important Matter.
Our Holly system of water works are a source of much pride to our city and are looked upon with wonder and admiration by strangers who visit the place. While we recognize the great value as a medium of distributing water throughout the city for domestic purposes, yet their strongest claims upon our praise is the wonderful efficacy in the hour of danger from fire, and their effectiveness in extinguishing the same. Already in the short time the works have been in operation property to the amount of many thousands of dollars has been saved. In fact in many instances the property shown their great value as a medium of preventing destruction to pay for the works several times over. As a means of defense against an insidious enemy then is our works chiefly valuable, and as such a protector they should be cared for with jealous zeal. In this connection there are two distinct points that should be remedied at the earliest convenient moment. In the first place the pumping machinery should be in duplicate. This requires money yet it would be money well spent. There should be two distinct sets of machinery. One plant may not give out, but such things have happened and a leakage that would stop the work of the pumps might occur at the most unfavorable moment. With duplicate machinery there would be no cause to apprehend such an accident, and the town would be safe beyond every chance. In the second place the machinery should be in a fire-proof building by itself. The present quarters are good ones, but in case the mill should take fire the valuable machinery would be destroyed. We mention this simply for the purpose of pointing out existing defects that are in a measure faulty and dangerous, yet for which no blame can be attached to any one. We presume these changes will take place in time, in fact they must. We have no other object in mentioning this matter than a desire to bring the subject before our people and enlist their interest in perfecting the water works system. That which improves its efficiency should secure the support of every property holder, as that is the class most directly interested in perfecting the means of protection against the invado of fire.

Smelter and Refinery.

The article from Bullion, in your issue of the 26th, presents many valuable suggestions that concern Spokane Falls. Of course, men who have devoted their lives to other pursuits had but little of mining terms, having had no occasion to learn them.
Reduction works are those used simply to reduce the ores, as they are taken from the ledges, to bullion, which is the bars of metal made by smelting that are not refined. In other words, bullion, or base bullion, is generally composed of two or more metals. The mines in Stevens county will in many cases produce gold, silver, lead and copper, and, in almost all cases, the three former and in some cases other less valuable metals. To reduce ores to bullion on the ground is the first economical step in reducing the expense of transportation, and is most proper where all the fluxes and fuel can be obtained with facility and economy.
Refining works take this bullion and separate each bullion to itself, making bar or refined bars; the bars of precious metals being ready for the assayer and coiner and the base metals for the artisan and manufacturer. The Stevens county people are on the right track and we should encourage and assist them in their efforts to establish reduction works on the ground, if they have the power and other requisites on hand. They should weigh carefully whether it would cost more to transport their ore from, or their material to the mines. If they find in favor of the latter, that it is the cheapest, then it is the proper thing for them to go ahead. If they do not, then Spokane Falls is the most eligible place, for both reduction and refining works, and they should combine with Spokane Falls. With unequalled water power and situated on a great national highway, we can draw the material needed from any other state or territory. Should they establish their reduction works, Spokane Falls wants a combination reduction and refining works anyhow. One smelter in Stevens county cannot meet the future demand for reducing all the ores of the great and varied metalline region of which we are the center.
Such works once established here, it would require only the shadow of an effort to get a United States assay and sub-treasurer's office, where the precious metals would be purchased and the money directly distributed among us. In that event the course of thousands of precious streams would be turned into Spokane Falls, and, possibly, at no remote day, a mint would be established here. If the results follow that are so loudly proclaimed by our metal-ripped hills, it will be the immense country of the Coeur d'Alene, with its slumbering millions, is daily expanding and reaching out north and south. It is now principally tributary to Helena, Butte City and other points east, but can be turned to this place. Soon the dividing line between the Coeur d'Alene and the Clearwater and its tributaries south, and the Stevens county belt north, will be obliterated and it will be one grand mining country, unrequited in extent, variety and business wealth.
This can mostly be brought to our doors by the divergence from this point of railroads, south to Lewiston, and north to Little Dalles, virtually spiking the Oregon Short Line to the Canadian Pacific, the central spike being driven here on the N. P. R. R. Capitalists will do this if we "make" our virtue of our other necessities.
These reflections may be smiled at as wild fancy, but energy, with a fixed purpose and unity of action, will bring in all to pass in the near future. What we advance now in the furtherance of these reduction and refining enterprises is only a temporary loan and will pour back with royal interest.
BASE METAL.
Skating Rink.
The new managers of the Niagara skating rink, Messrs. Fullingham & Co., are sparing no expense in fitting up the monster building that is to be devoted to the roller skating pastime this winter. They have been busily engaged several weeks in making interior alterations and additions and exterior improvements upon the premises, aiming to make it comfortable during the cold season not only for those who exercise on rollers, but also to those who attend merely to witness the gyrations of the agile sliders. The outside of the building has been covered with an extra coating of weather board which ensures more warmth, while ample heaters will be provided inside. An electric light will illuminate the front of the building, and the interior will probably be lit by the same means. The house will be under the personal management of Wm. Oliver, a young gentleman who has considerable experience in the roller skating business, and who will aim to make the resort a popular one both to ladies and gentlemen. Under his supervision we expect to see the Niagara rink prove a profitable venture. It is expected that the opening will take place some day next week, the exact date of which will be duly announced in these columns.
