



WASHINGTON TERRITORY. According to the census of 1880 Washington Territory had a population of 75,116.

The absence of returns in former census from Adams, Asotin, Douglas, Franklin, Grant, Kootenai, Lemhi and Shoshone is explained in the fact that they were created out of other counties, and had no separate returns in the taking of previous censuses.

The auditor estimates that excluding the railroad property there has been an actual increase in valuation of the territory over 1880 of about \$2,000,000. The full value of railroad property in the territory is placed at \$25,000,000, though in the counties it assessed in 1884 was only a shade over \$3,000,000.

Spokane Falls is a distributing point for a vast region of country and many thousands of dollars are annually spent in this city for supplies. As a sample of the extent of business we give the figures of the sales made by G. P. Dart for the two months of August and September alone. Mr. Dart is agent for the Westinghouse company machinery and also has a small saw mill a short distance from this city. The gentleman is only one of the many others engaged in this branch of business in our city, and his sales are an indication of the large amounts spent annually for farming supplies. Of course the two months mentioned are considered the best in the year, yet the house over which Mr. Dart has control does a good business all the year around.

His report is as follows: Six steam threshers complete, one large separator for steam, one steam saw mill, two horse power machines, total \$18,300; Byron Jackson's forks and feeders 450; Mitchell wagons 1,731; Machine oil and axle grease, 463; Hoisting machinery, twine and extras 1,285; Westinghouse Co. extras 250; Plows and sundry extras 350; Belting 240; Lumber 4,200.
