Our people cannot afford to have this misfortune befall the children of the city. It would have a demoralizing effect upon the whole school system. Some of our citizens may ask why an extra tax is necessary now. The reasons are obvious. A fow years ago, when the city was small, the school monies received were amply sufficient to keep the small, the school monies received were amply sufficient to keep the school in operation. The building occupied by the few scholars was little better than a barn, and the little better than a barn, and int furniture and fixtures would have put to shame the shabblest frontier dug-out. Spokane has grown rapid ly and when but three or four year ago there were but two or three dozen school c'ilidren there are now veral hundred, and the quarters the command of the trustees are inadequate to comfortably accommodate the children applying for addate the children applying for admission. The income upon which the schools depend is wholly insufficient to carry out even a short school year. The outside country is far more benefited by the growth of Spokane Falls in this respect than is the city. Our taxes for school purposes amount to over \$4000 that goes into the county school fund, and after the amount apportioned to the Falls is withdrawn there is left a balance of upward \$2500 to be distributed among other school districts in the county. This does not seem just, but it is according to the prescribed laws governing to the prescribed laws governing school matters in county government and the various school districts of the county are enabled to prosper through this contribution made by this city. Such being the case all deficits must be made by special traxation, and for the past two years the property owners have been appealed to in the dilemma, and so far have never failed to vote the tax with their customary liberality, and we feet that in this instance there will be inhesitancy in favoring the proposition. While the amount is so small as to work no hardship upon the property holder, yet the income from that source will be sufficient to carry on the schools several months and leave to book on the spring with no indebtedness on its hands. mission. T., and Spokane Falls, running through the heart of Shoshone county and the richest gold and silver bearing region, on the continent. The surveyors of the company are now reported to be on the South Fork, secritaining whether the route is a feasible one. There can be no doubt that something of this kind is contemplated by the company, as our western neighbors at Rockford and Farmington are full of railroad talk.
