**A GRAND FARCE.**

The fact that A. M. Cannon and B. H. Bennett (who were bound over to appear before the grand jury on a charge of attempt to commit murder) were not indicted, was not owing to a lack of all the evidence necessary under ordinary circumstances. In older settlements, where law is properly respected and rigidly enforced, such a crime as they committed would have been punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary for a fixed number of years. The names of witnesses placed in the hands of the proper authorities, could truthfully testify that Cannon stated before he made the attack, when remonstrated with, that he "had the law in his pocket," and that Cannon and Bennett left the bank when they expected and probably knew no one was to be present in the office but their intended victim and his wife and child; they turned out of their natural course, to avoid notice, passed down over a gulch, crossed the ravine, came behind and between buildings to a point on Howard street, where they quickly crossed over and entered the TIMES office. Entering in a friendly manner, they chose their positions and after a few words Cannon stated in a loud voice that he "feared neither God, man nor the devil," and he "would kill the editor if he did not do as he wished him to do; Bennett saying, "I am going to take a part in this." Each attempted twice to shoot Mr. Cook, but were prevented from so doing by having their arms struck down by an iron "side-stick." The man whose life they were vainly struggling to end in the presence of his wife and babe, had it in his power to kill them, and gave them their lives twice, each, trusting that the law would give them sufficient punishment for their attempt to murder. They have evidence of these facts on their persons to-day. After this encounter was ended, and Mr. Cook had given up his iron bar, Cannon again attacked him on the street with words too vile to print, cocked his revolver and threatened to shoot Mr. Cook. This was witnessed by over twenty of our citizens. He acknowledged having shot at Mr. Cook while in the office, and wondered why he did not hit him.

The above statements are facts, and can be clearly proven by the witnesses whose names were given to the prosecuting attorney for this district. That Cannon and Bennett were not indicted is no evidence that they were not guilty, because the above facts are well understood by the residents of this city, and are commented upon by people all over the Northwest. We are almost ashamed to tell the world that such an atrocious crime goes unpunished; but such is the history of all new countries. Until this country is more densely settled, and its inhabitants respect the law, we must expect the rich and vicious to escape just punishment, while the poor are given no quarter whatever.

Mr. Kellogg, of the Cheney Tribune, has found it to be his temporary advantage to shield the parties who made the recent raid on the TIMES office, accompanied by vile oaths and two revolvers. Kellogg thinks they came for peace; but the threats made beforehand; their roundabout journey to this office with revolvers in their overcoat pockets, and the demon-like demonstrations on the street with a revolver, after the fight was over, indicated nothing else but a desperate attempt to

**WASHINGTON.**

WASHINGTON, April 21.—A bill was introduced by Grover and unanimously passed both houses and was signed by the president to-day creating a new collection district in Oregon, with Yaquina as the port of entry.

Judge Wyllie overruled the motion of defendants in the star route cases to compel the prosecution to furnish a bill of particulars as to the overt acts charged. Wilson, for the defense noted exceptions, and asked for plea of not guilty in turn, and that the case be withdrawn and he be allowed to quash. The request was held under consideration until Monday.

The president has nominated Alpheus Taft, of Ohio, as minister to Austria.

The bible used in the senate for swearing senators has been stolen. It has been used 53 years, and every senator admitted in that period was sworn on that bible and kissed it. It is the supposition that it has been taken by somebody as a relique.

The revenue steamer Corwin will be sent to-day to the rescue of the crew of the Rogers.

The house committee on territories has directed Richardson to report favorably a bill for the organization of a judicial district of Alaska, and the establishment of civil government. The bill provides for a justice, three associate justices, and a U. S. marshal, who shall act as officers of the government. It also provides for the extension over Alaska of the land and the timber and mining laws of Oregon, Nevada, Colorado and Washington Territory.

Minister Sargent has received instructions to leave to-day, en route for Europe.

**The Chinese Bill.**

NEW YORK, April 21.—A Washington correspondent says the senate committee has stricken out of the Chinese bill the section which forbids the naturalization of Chinamen and the section forbidding the immigration of skilled laborers. Pacific coast senators say they will make an effort to reinstate those sections. The action of the republican caucus this morning indicates that they will support the bill as passed by the house.

Pacific coast men are indignant that eastern merchants are signing petitions against the Chinese bill, and threaten to boycott eastern merchants who sign such petitions.

In the senate Miller and Farley gave notice of their purpose to press the Chinese bill on Monday, if pending business is disposed of; otherwise, on Tuesday.

The Chinese bill was subject to some remarks during the republican caucus, several eastern senators desiring to obtain a caucus declaration in support of the senate committee's amendments. The house bill, however, had made a little progress when the caucus adjourned; consequently, no action was taken in regard to it.

**GENERAL NEWS.**

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., April 21.—To-day the grand jury presented indictments against Geo. W. Irwin, A. W. Scott, A. J. Crowther and John Cox, for stealing \$10,000 in bonds from the city register's office. The prisoners waived formal arraignment, and pleaded "not guilty." Bonds were fixed at \$5,000, each. Crowther gave bonds; the others went to jail.

Irwin stated that Crowther, the former register of the city, had a duplicate key to the city safe made, and accompanied by Cox and Scott, stole the bonds; also, had arranged to steal \$200,000 more.

PITTSBURG, April 21.—The damage by the storm in Fayette county is worse than was at first reported. The tornado started at Bradford, and trees of the largest dimensions were twisted and uprooted, and houses were blown down and barns demolished.

CHICAGO, April 21.—A special says Carrollton, La., was struck by a whirlwind last Tuesday; the wharf was lifted and carried a square distant, several houses unroofed, property greatly damaged, the German school completely destroyed, a number of persons severely hurt, but none killed. All neighboring towns, report has it, are more or less damaged.

BLOOMFIELD, Ia., Apr. 21.—The special reports of devastation by a cyclone in the country recently, by good chance, did not strike any one; damage was confined to farms fences and isolated buildings; no death reported.

NEWS OF THE WORLD!

GENERAL NEWS.

PORTLAND, April 17.—The British steamer, Mary Tatham, which sailed from Hong Kong March 28 for Portland, with a cargo of Chinese laborers and merchandise, was reported wrecked off the coast of China. The crew was saved. The ship's cargo is supposed to be a total loss.

LONDON, April 17.—The Observer's Dublin correspondent believes Parnell on his return to the Kilmainham jail will be unconditionally released. CRISFIELD, Md., April 17.—One-third of the business portion of town was burned last night. Loss, 75,000; insured, 35,000. James Booth, in whose store the fire originated, was arrested on a charge of arson.

CHARLESTON, April 17.—The sealed verdict in action of the election case will be opened to-morrow, it is made known unofficially, and found guilty abstracting the count of votes, but not guilty of all other points in the indictment. The verdict was accompanied by a recommendation of mercy.

CHICAGO, April 17.—A remarkably bright aurora borealis was visible here to-night. It was perfectly defined, extending nearly to the zenith. The air was so charged with electricity, that the telegraph would not work with the batteries connected with the wire now in operation between Chicago, New York and intermediate points and Chicago and Omaha. The wire between Chicago and St. Paul closed on account of no warning to St. Paul to disconnect their battery. The display at St. Paul was reported very brilliant.

SALT LAKE, April 18.—Hints dropped during the recent conference of the Mormon Church were acted upon today, the burden of the discourses in the tabernacle being that the Saints are not to trade with or patronize the Gentiles. Conservative Mormons openly deprecate this policy and pay no attention to it, but the fanatic masses obey the council, and the consequence will doubtless be financial trouble. It is said the Gentiles will retaliate by discharging their Mormon employes, and by buying nothing of the Saints that they can avoid.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., April 18.—An unconditional pardon has been granted the Ford brothers, who plead guilty of having killed Jesse James at St. Joseph, and who were sentenced to be hanged on the 19th of May.

CHARLESTON, S. C.—Two white jurors in the election cases came to court this morning and stated that they signed the verdict under misapprehension and bodily pain. The judge held that it was too late; defendants excepted, and made a motion for a new trial. The judge overruled the motion of defendants to quash the arraignment of the grand jury on the ground that the talesmen had been illegally drawn.

St. Louis, April 18.—Three county judges of Green county, Mo., appear before the U. S. court of Jefferson City today, to show cause why they failed to lety tax to pay the interest on the Kansas City and Memphis railroad bonds. The bonded debt and interest accrued amount to over \$500,000. Citizens of Green county declare they

will not pay the bonds. Farmers are organized as "Brothers of Freedom" to resist payment of the tax. When the land is sold for taxes they propose to buy it in for one dollar, and they declare openly that the climate of Green county will not be healthy for any person who bids higher.

PACIFIC COAST.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 18.—For personal injuries received by a fall occasioned by a bad sidewalk, Lewis R. Floss to day recovered in the district court \$200 from the city.

A chamber of commerce for the city of Seattle has been organized with a membership of 223, and constitution and by-laws adopted. Officers have been elected as follows: J. R. Lewis, president; Bailey Gatzert, vice-president; C. P. Stone, secretary; Thomas Burke, recording secretary; and Geo. W. Harris, treasurer.

FOREIGN NEWS.
