Turning to the Right.

Why does the custom prevail of passing to the right in driving? This query is somewhat difficult to answer, as there are no substantial facts that can be adduced in explanation. The custom ori ginated, perhaps, in the early days of New England, when the roads were passable only to horse-men and oxteams. In driving oxen the custom has always bee for the driver to walk on the left side of the cartin order to see better, make the requisite calculation or teams passing in the opposit direction, and also to enable him to larrup the team with his right hand. In this way the two driv ers came together, and any acof wheels was thereby avoided When the roads became settle! and were accessible to light vehicles, the ox-carts were, in a de-gree, superseded by the former but the drivers were probably the une, and consequently retained

their old-time habits. The custom in England and most foreign countries, with the exception of France, is to pass to the left in trav ing either by carriage or rail The English settlers of New England probably retained this habit on the first entrance to the New World; but were afterward obliged to abandon it in view of the exigencies of locomoting by oxen If this theory, and it appears reasonable, is accepted, the cuscom of passing to the right by our orefathers was of course perpetuated to their descendants, and as thus been handed down un to the present day. However the system of locomotion in Amer ica now in vogue may have ori ginated, the custom is uncouth, and sometimes fraught with danger. Why a man who is driving spirited or unruly horse should sit on that side of the wagon furthest removed from the pas sing vehicles, and thus, by his incapacity to obtain a full and clear view of the road and his proximity to other vehicles, engender risk of limb or even surpasses the common under-standing. It may be argued that he can better use his whip hand in this position, but by pass

Care of the Hands

Finger nails may be greatly im both in color and shape by proved note in color and shape by proper attention. Their care should become one-of the most important of the minor operations of the toilet, for the concliness of the hand depends, largely on their condition. The tender, tapeting nail, of a rosy, pink, hus with turbulen and these is the hue, with transparent edges, is the desideratum. Stop cutting the nails squarely off, trim instead closely at the corners, leaving the center rathe: long, so as to give the required oval shape. Keep them clean with a nail brush: avoid the use of a knife for this purpose, as the inner substance of the nail should not be scraped and the edge thereby rendered opaque Rub the pail with the towel when drying the hands, not only for the polish imported thereby, but to keep the skin of the firgors from growing on the nails in deep, unsightly rims. The avoidance of placing the hands in extreme temperatures of water will quickly render them soft. Always washing toe hands in tepid— not warm - water, and in winter rub bing two or three drops of glycer ne over them previous to drying with a towel will prevent reduces and rough ness of skin. A tree use of glycerin hould, however, be avoided during hot weather, as it is then likely to impart a vellow tinge to the skir Impair a yellow tinge to the skin. Use as little soap as may be, and see to it that a good article only is employed. Well-seasoned white eastlie soap is advised as being less subject to adulteration than many of the fancy sorts.
