A FEW FACTS ABOUT PUBLIC AFFAIRS.

AN EYE OPENER.

The SPOKAN TIMES was established in April, 1879. At that time and up to the present date, the name, good will and material attached to this office has belonged to the present owner. The paper has been published at times under very disadvantageous circumstances, but has prospered with the progress of the new country in which it was the first to give the weekly tidings of the Spokan country to the world. In every prominent public movement THE TIMES has taken an active part. This paper has always favored the best interests of the greatest number; but in doing this it has met with the greatest opposition from those who should have extended to it the right hand of fellowship. Early in the history of this paper it became evident that while THE TIMES pursued the honest and honorable course of representing the best interest of the greatest number, it could not suit the town proprietors of Spokan Falls. Our plan of meeting all public questions was to do so in an open, frank and public manner; theirs, to take hold of a public question in a sneaking way, in order to undermine the best interests of the county or community, and fill the pockets of a select few. Our plan was to lay before the public in a clear light every public question; theirs, to discuss a public question in a private manner, and in secret conclave decide upon plans by which to uphold or crush a public measure. This fact has already been revealed to many persons by actual experience. When the question of carving a new county out of Stevens was being mooted, the editor of THE TIMES invited public discussion of the subject through its columns. This was a proposition too honorable. It might lead to a satisfactory ending for the people, but not for their private aims. Because of this fact, the town proprietors secretly denounced this paper and its editor. Not wishing to have the public understand that we really had men so small in our midst who had assumed to themselves the authority of running the town, we kept quietly and steadily on representing the best interests of the town and country.

When the question of permanently locating the county seat of Spokan county came up, THE TIMES worked faithfully and earnestly for the town in which it was issued, for which act we are not ashamed; and had it not been for the just indignation of many old settlers throughout the county whose interests have been dealt foully with by the clique named, Spokan Falls would be the county seat to-day. THE TIMES gave the partial and full counts of the returning boards as a matter of news, but did not sustain the action of the returning board in throwing out the votes of several precincts. The effort to retain the county seat at Spokan Falls against the expressed wish of the majority, and the foolish question of appeal to the supreme court, could not be supported by

THE TIMES to the satisfaction of the little ring. They had the sale of town lots and the lion's share of an extortionate attorney's fee in view. We had the plain path of duty to follow.

The question of spanning the Spokan river with a free bridge is still fresh in the minds of the residents of this city. That enterprise was the greatest ever undertaken in our midst. Who did all that low cunning and misrepresentation could do to defeat that most worthy enterprise? The members of the little ring of still hunters mentioned. Why? Because they wished to defeat the interests of those business men on Howard street, and had town lots unsold which they wished to make saleable by locating the bridge to the disadvantage of the greatest number of our citizens. Did they use means low, and foul, and beneath the dignity of gentlemen, in order to defeat this great enterprise? Yes, thrice, yes!—and most of our citizens know it. THE TIMES favored the Howard street bridge because it was a great public enterprise in which the best interests of the town and county were centered. And, thanks to a generous public and energetic building committee, the bridge is finished. At the last moment, when it was evident that their opposition could not prevent the last timber from being laid, the members of the little ring gave very small sums in proportion to their property, in order to avoid public scorn—not because they were favorable to the enterprise.

In order to have an organ of their own with which to mislead the public whenever occasion might offer an opportunity, the ring decided to purchase press and type, and to select some one who would do just what they wanted him to do—no matter how low they might wish him to stoop. They had to do this, for no honest man can represent the true interests of this city and county, and at the same time serve the ring. The interests of the ring are not identical with those of our citizens. J. N. Glover & Co. must rule the property for which they have already received a price, or do their best to ruin the prospects of the real owners. They are a blight upon the place, standing between our city and the prosperity to which it is entitled. They foster no enterprise but such as pays them tribute. It is a known fact that they have driven trade from our town on former occasions, and continue to do so. Let it be fully known that they control our city, and prosperity will cease to be a characteristic of the place. People need have but little fear, however. Their latest effort was to locate the school house in such an out-of-the-way position as to make valuable town lots which were otherwise unsaleable. In this effort they signally failed, even though the questions were arranged with an idea of forcing a vote favorable to their schemes.

HAUL DOWN YOUR SIGN.
We must very respectfully request the "Tribune" to haul down its sign "Official Paper of Spokan County," which it persists in printing at the head of its local columns. At the last session of the Board of Commissioners the Spokan DAILY and WEEKLY TIMES was made the official paper of Spokan county, according to law; and in such official paper the officers of the county are required to publish all official notices. New subscribers to local papers often take this question into account; therefore, the false statement at the head of the "Tribune's" columns is liable to mislead its readers. Let us hope that Brother Kellogg has left this heading in his paper by mistake, rather than by intent to mislead.

At the late meeting of the teachers' institute, resolutions were passed asking the three papers in the county to publish the proceedings. The secretary was about to furnish the copy, when the editor of the Tribune took the only copy, and said he would furnish the other papers proof sheets. Having failed to do this he has defeated the object of the institute and disappointed the teachers attending the same, as well as the public, but the act gives a proper measure of the man.

The Star Route Ring.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—The star route ring is demoralized. They feel that lightning is about to strike them, but don't know just how or where it will hit. This morning there was a conference held at Arlington hotel between James, MacVeagh, George Bliss, B. H. Brewster and others who represent the prosecution. Bliss submitted indictments which he had carefully drawn against Brad-Dorsey, McGrew, ex-chief clerk French, Saulsbury, Gilmer and other star route contractors and beneficiaries of the ring. James and MacVeagh and other officials engaged in the prosecution have no confidence whatever in Corkhill and they make no secret of the fact. They do not charge that Corkhill has been influenced by any money consideration to favor the star route ring, but believe his social and personal relations to say the least, so influence him. All the officials concerned in the prosecution maintain Corkhill has obstructed their progress from the first, and therefore was determined to prepare all papers of presentment fully and keep them in his heart, so that all he will have to do will be to submit them to the grand jury. This is why Bliss drew down the papers, and although Bliss has some pressing business in New York, he has remained here at the request of the postmaster and attorney general, to watch the postmaster of these cases. It is the intention of the prosecution to ask the grand jury to take hold of the case immediately upon next Monday, but as Corkhill insists upon presenting Guiteau's case first, that will take precedence. Several persons implicated have confessed and given away operations of the ring. The prompt and determined stand of President Arthur in favor of vigorous prosecution, has demoralized and disunited the ring leaders, who had kept weak ones silent by assuring them if Arthur became president, the whole matter should immediately be quashed.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Lewis the regulator's candidate for Lieut. Gov. of Virginia, says Mahone will be more embarrassed voting on the organization of the senate than last session. He is not the man to shirk responsibility of any kind.

Owing to red tape, the order to fire a salute in honor of President Garfield was not received till last night. The first salute was fired this morning.

Kalakaua sends word that he will reach here this evening, and go to Cincinnati tomorrow, whence he will go to Lexington to buy horses.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Warrants for the star route people were filed yesterday and served and returned. Brady, Turner and French are here to report this afternoon. McDonough is in Dakota, and Brown is absent.

New York, Oct. 2.—The Tribune, adopting the present estimates for New York and Brooklyn, says 384 delegates are elected or assured by primaries. Garfield republicans have 194; Conkling republicans, 116, with the remainder in doubt.

Murat Halstead interviewed President Arthur showing his disposition to be advised or led by Conkling, 30,000 Ohio republicans will stay away from the polls on election day, and the democratic ticket will be elected by a vote larger than that of Bishop in 1877. The legislature will be under democratic control, and the democrats will gain by the new district 10 new representatives in congress.

The Sun's Washington Special says president Arthur's policy provides for an early and searching investigation into the treasury department.

A merchant named Jackson, doing business on East river front, today laid before the police commissioners a letter which he interpreted to be a determination of the part of a Utica man to assassinate Conkling. The letter expressed the opinion that Conkling deserved death. The writer said he was coming to New York on the occasion of the state convention next Wednesday. He said Conkling should not be admitted, be the consequences what they might.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 1.—The October issue of the American Journal of Medical Science contains the official report of the autopsy of President Garfield, prepared by the surgeons in charge of the official record of the post mortem examination.

Oct. 1.—Gen. Scoville, Guitau's brother-in-law, says that owing to the solicitations of his wife, who is Guitau's only friend, he will act as counsel for the assassin. He will so inform District Attorney Corkhill this day. He has no fear but there will be a fair trial. He will not take advantage of any technicalities, but will make insanity the only defense.

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 2.—The report of purser Warwick of the steamer E. J. Irving, is as follows: Steamer took fire loading at Hope at 2:30 P. M. today; fire originated among some hay. In less than ten minutes the whole framework was burned to the main deck. Two Indians, two horses and two cows were burned. Malls, express, passengers' baggage, treasures—everything—lost; nothing saved. The steamer was cut adrift to save the town. Estimated loss, \$120,000.

COLFAX.

Local News by Telegraph COLFAX, Oct. 3.—R. M. Stepl, contractor on the Texas Ferry and Colfax railroad, has moved his camp to a point within three miles of Colfax.

Fifteen to eighteen thousand brick per day are hauled from the kiln near town and used on the Grostein & Binard and Wm. H. Mastin buildings. Wheat is worth forty-two cents per bushel in Colfax.

The effort of J. N. Glover to blackmail the editor of this paper in the last issue of his organ, and his threats to continue in the same line, may possibly bring him a better harvest than the most sanguine of his class can even expect before he has finished the job he has undertaken of wiping THE TIMES out of existence. So far, he has merited and received the scorn and derision of all good citizens for his blackmailing scheme. They know very well that his object is to prevent us from discussing questions in which he wants to take advantage of the public. While they believe him to be willing to undertake a blackmailing scheme, they question his discretion in this instance. Were it of a private nature, the public would not take so much interest in the matter. But they see an effort put forth to prevent an independent and free newspaper from protecting the interests of the people under all circumstances. He does this simply because his interests and those of his little band are not in common with the public's best interests.

President Villard, of the N. P. and O. R. & N. companies, accompanied by local railroad and seaboat officials and capitalist friends, is now making a tour on the Sound. They will return to Portland in time to reach this city about Thursday next. Their journey over the Northern Pacific road will, of necessity, be one of unusual haste, not permitting them to make the close observations they would like in this new and progressive country. It is probable that the party will take a journey over Pend d'Oeille lake in the new steamboat, and then return to Portland. They will treat Sprague, Cheney and Spokan Falls with very brief calls.

While it is not improbable that the N. P. machine and car shops will be erected at Sprague, in accordance with the judgment exercised by General Superintendent Sprague, there is still a slight cloud of doubt hanging over the whole affair. If the wishes of the conductors and train men along the line were to decide the location, Spokan Falls would be the place. If Hon. Benj. P. Cheney had the say-so, they would be located at Cheney. But the questions of distance, water and economy will be the ruling ones, and the railroad officials will undoubtedly measure the claims of supposed-to-be rival towns by that standard.

By a very selfish man, this paper is charged with having a good word for every other town in this part of the country. We plead guilty, and hope publishers in sister towns may assume the same attitude toward Spokan Falls. They will be able to do so when the low spirit of selfishness so common with the few who have been bent upon ruling or ruining this town and country ceases to be a curse to the place.

Were we asked to express the wish of the republicans of this section regarding President Arthur's administration, we would state that they will be best pleased if he follows as closely as possible the plans laid down by the illustrious man whose position he now occupies.

A SENATE SESSION CALLED.—President Arthur has issued a proclamation calling the Senate in executive session on the 10th of October. The opinion is generally accepted that the Democrats will elect a president pro tem and a clerk. These officials must be elected before new members can be sworn in. Senator Bayard, who, by rank, is entitled to the Democratic nomination for president pro tem, does not anticipate an exciting session. He thinks all party questions will be amicably arranged, and that the extra session may not last more than one week.
