There are three routes which Eastern paraple may take in coming hither. If a person wants to save time, and desires to bring stock, waxons, &c., the quickest and most direct route would be to come from Omahn to Oxdon; thence by waxon road to this new country; traversing the distance, from Oxdon in two or three weeks, when roads are good—say in the mo.t.! of June, July or August. The se having neither waxons nor teams, can come by rail to Kelton, at a coet of alpoint \$50 in emigrant car; thence by stage to Walla Walla, at an expense of £50, exclusive of meals, and on to Colfax or Spokan £31s, at an additional expense of ten and seven dollars, respectively. The remaining route is via. San Francisco, by rail, thence to Portland, Oregon, by ocean There are three routes which Easter thence to Portland, Oregon, by Steamer; thence to Almota, by 'out Fare to Portland, \$2 to \$30, according to cabin occupied, and state of opposition or the route; to Almota, \$18, exclusive of meals and birth.
