SPOKAN FALLS.

Spokane Falls has become a city of acknowledged importance without the blowing of trumpets or the aid of any unfair means. This city stands to-day as a rival to no town in the county; neither has it a rival. The city of Spokane Falls is simply the result of a naturally fine location and the growth of the surrounding country. Its history, thus far, is merely such as is recorded of all other leading towns in any new country. Nature has indicated where the commercial emporium of Northeastern Washington shall be, and the wisdom of men has accordingly given aid by centering to this point all highways, stage lines, thoroughfares, the telegraph, the railroad, the manufacturing, the educational, the wholesale mercantile, the clerical, and other interests. Men and women come to this city, and come frequently, from all parts of the country. They come because it is to their interests to do so. There are but few people in Spokane county who do not have positive and particular interests in Spokane Falls which call them here many times during the year. The volume of trade which comes to Spokane Falls from the surrounding country increases quite perceptibly with each succeeding

LANDS WITHDRAWN.

The officers of the N. P. R. R. land office in this city have received orders to stop the sale of lands in fourteen townships north and west of Colfax. The amount of land withheld is about one hundred and forty-nine thousand acres, and is embraced in: Tp. 16, N., R. 40, 41, 42, 43, E. " 17, N., R. 40, 41, 42, 43, E. " 18, N., R. 41, 42, 43, 44, E. " 19, N., R. 44 and 45, E. It is rumored that these lands have been purchased by the O. R. & N. Co. for the purposes of colonization.

AN INFORMAL BALLOT.

SATISFACTORY REASONS WHY THE PEOPLE OF SPOKAN COUNTY WILL NOT PERMANENTLY LOCATE THEIR COUNTY SEAT AT THE COMING ELECTION. On the second day of November, on the day of the general election, the voters of Spokane county will vote upon the question of permanently locating the county seat of this county. When Spokane county was organized, the county seat was temporarily located at Spokane Falls, to be permanently located by the voice of the legal voters of the county. The coming ballot on this question will undoubtedly be an informal one. No definite choice will be made; and subsequent developments will indicate more plainly where the county seat really should be. It is positively unwise to permanently locate the county seat of a growing county in any obscure town which may spring into existence simultaneously with this question. Final coming election would be premature and probably suicidal to the best interests of the county. Each town of any importance in this county has interests at stake in the coming contest which it cannot afford to surrender at the more command of a hired press, or the bidding of non-resident speculators in town lots on lands where the title is completely hidden by a labyrinth of possible ownership. This very question, two years hence, will be before the people of Spokane county. By that time, the development of the county's most prominent points will place the matter in a very different light before the people. Hundreds of voters will rejoice because the question is not decided, for then they can cast their votes for the most advantageous point. Two years hence, Medical Lake, or some place in the White Bluffs or Deep creek country, may be the most prominent point. Spangle, which to-day is a town of creditable dimensions, may then lay reasonable claims upon our votes. Marshall, Augusta and Four Lakes should not be ignored; and Sprague, the most eligibly located town between Ainsworth and Spokane Falls, will in two years (if indications can be relied upon) eclipse any station on the line between the points named. All, all, have an unwritten future, and the possibilities of any one of the towns mentioned are to-day equal to those of its sisters. The system of railroads which is destined to make a checker-board of Eastern Washington within the next two or three years, will naturally change the complexion of the whole country. Every town which is to-day located in the center of an agricultural belt of land twelve miles in width, will, sooner or later, have the advantage of railroad communication. This is but the history of all new states. Now that the trunk lines from Eastern Washington to Portland and Puget Sound are assured, local and branch roads will be constructed into all the important valleys in Eastern Washington. Spokane county will have its share. The rich farming lands of Pine Grove and Hangman will be drained by a railroad, and the golden sheaves of Four Lakes, Deep creek and White Bluff prairies will bow to the iron horse. New towns will spring up, and some of the present towns will become of still greater importance. The eyes of our people will be opened to the capabilities of our country, and they will then see clearly where destiny has located the most important towns. New county lines will, of course, have to be drawn, which will very materially change the aspect of affairs. The men who stand nobly by their own towns now, and, like patriots, valiantly support their own and their neighbors' interests, will then have an opportunity to do better by themselves than ever before. When the question comes before the people again, two years hence, the self-styled friends, but real enemies of Spangle, Medical Lake, Marshall, and other towns, will very naturally turn to

before dictating to the people the proper course they should pursue. If they find that for these towns there was but a very light vote polled, they will fix upon said record as a precedent, and claim that "inasmuch as your vote was light in '80, your vote, of course, don't want your town to figure in the contest." Think of this, voter. This will be the result, as sure as fate. No man or set of men can honestly say there are but two towns to be voted for in the present campaign. If they do, they say so for a price, and against the interests of the growing sections and towns in our county. Many men will vote for their own towns or nearest trading points, because it is to their but interests to do so. They will not, like Esau of old, sell their birthrights for pottage; neither will they deny their own interests, or shadow their future prospects, at the bidding of non-resident speculators. In the coming year their own town is possibly the beginning of a contest which will permanently locate the county seat in their midst. With these facts in view, we cannot blame, but rather admire, the sensible man who, by a single vote, will favor his own interests, his own or nearest town, and his future prosperity. And he who would say otherwise, at the present time, has personal interests at stake, or is paid for saying it. But in all instances, the man who is loyal to the interests of his county and the taxpayers in general, will cast his vote only for a town where property can be deeded. In the hope of creating a state which will be able to withstand the power of Chili, says the Oregonian, consolidation of Peru and Bolivia is proposed. The terms of the proposed union are substantially those which have been sanctioned by the practical experience of many federal republics. There are a common president, a common supreme judicial court and a common congress of legislation. To the federal government is given the sole power to make war, establish treaties, legislate upon commerce, coin money, etc. The powers not expressly conferred by the new constitution are reserved to the two component states. Peru and Bolivia are yet to vote on this project. It may be distasteful to either or both. About fifty-five years have passed since the south and southeast provinces of Peru were separated from that state to form a new republic under the name of Bolivia. Some twelve years later the states were reunited in a confederation, but a revolution brought the union to a close, and Peru and Bolivia returned to their previous forms of government. Judging from the past, there is now little prospect of a harmonious and efficient union between them. But Peru, reduced to extremity by Chili, will probably be glad to do anything to get help. Still, it is possible, and even probable, that Chili would be able to overcome Peru and Bolivia combined. A WRONG IMPRESSION.—The Watchman properly says: "It is wrong to show men and their numerous attaches to presume that when they favor (9) an editor with a complimentary ticket, to count, if not treat him as a 'dead head.' No be "unoffered" land and thirty days if it be "offered" land, before filing his claim, and have five years' residence counted from the day of settlement. If he has settled on unsurveyed land he must make his filing within three months from the filing of the township plat in the land office. The law says this residence must be a continued one for five years, but this does not prevent temporary absence for labor, even of several months, or for visits. There is a very general mistaken idea, however, that if the homesteader pays an occasional visit to his land every few weeks or months he is living on it sufficiently to hold his claim. Late decisions hold that such proceeding would be evidence of an attempt to evade the law and would forfeit the land to the government. In five years he can, or within seven years he must, submit proof, under oath, consisting of his own testimony and that of two credible witnesses, that he has made the place his home and has cultivated it. If his proof is satisfactory he gets a patent without further cost, excepting the final Land Office fees of \$12 inside of railroad limits and \$6 outside, and the cost of proof, amounting to \$4 in both cases. Any time after six months of actual residence the occupant may make final proof, and pay for his land at the rate of \$2.50 per acre if within railroad limits, or \$1.25 if without. Any contract to convey a portion of a claim before making final proof, destroys one's rights. An unmarried woman may take a claim, and if she marries a continued residence will give her a title in her own name. Under the homestead law the applicant must appear in person at the local land office, present his application, and take the required oath. The final affidavit and proof, however, may be made before the judge, or, in his absence, before the clerk of any court of record of the district in which the land is situated. A person should use his pre-emption right before he does his homestead, as in a pre-emption he has to swear that he has not abandoned a home of his own in the same state or territory to settle on his pre-emption land.

The Business Outlook.
New York, Sept. 30.—The Public confesses that clearing house exchanges for the last week are not entirely encouraging, and comments on the exhibit as follows: Operations of a single week do not afford adequate data for the belief that a general change in the course of business has set in, nor are reports so unanimous in their testimony as to prompt strong conclusions, but the irregularity and uncertainty which appear to contrast forcibly with the tenor of returns in October or November last year or during the first quarter of this year when gains were reported with regularity by almost every city, and exchanges outside of New York ranged from 230,000,000 to 260,000,000 each week. Banks work much more safely it is true because their transactions are not swayed by heavy speculative operations in merchandise nor by stock speculation as widely expanded as it was last fall or last March; but the business of the country has been in several important respects on account of serious uncertainties, and it would hardly be wise to calculate that these can be renewed until some weeks at least have elapsed. These things might cause great increase

to intimidate and obstruct the election, and the unprecedented use of the veto to maintain its corrupt and despotic power, insults the people and imperils their interests.

Fourth—The great fraud of 1876, by which upon a false count of the electoral vote of two States, the candidate defeated at the polls was declared to be President, and for the first time in American history the will of the people was set aside under threat of military violence, struck a deadly blow at our system of representative government. The Democratic party, to preserve the country from the horrors of a civil war, submitted for a time in the firm and patriotic faith that the people would punish the crime in 1880. This issue precedes and dwarfs all others. It imposes a more sacred duty upon the people of the Union than was ever ascribed to the conscience of a nation of freemen.

Fifth—We reaffirm the belief avowed in 1876 that the duties levied for the purpose of revenue should so discriminate as to favor American labor, but no further grant of the public domain should be made for the benefit of other corporations; that slavery having perished in the states, its twin barbarity, polygamy, must die in the territories; that every where the protection accorded to American birth must be secured to citizens by American adoption; that it is the duty of congress to develop and improve our water courses and harbors, but we insist that further subsidies to private persons or corporations must cease; that the obligations to men who preserved its integrity in the day of battle are undiminished by the lapse of 15 years since their final victory; their perpetual honor is and shall forever be the grateful privilege and the sacred duty of the American people.

Sixth—Since the authority to regulate immigration and intercourse between the United States and foreign lands rests with the congress of the United States and its treaty-making powers, the Republican party, regarding the unrestricted immigration of Chinese as an evil of great magnitude, invokes the exercise of that power to restrain and limit that immigration by the enactment of such just, humane and reasonable provisions as will produce that result.

Seventh—That the party and patriotism which characterized the illustrious career of B. B. Howe in peace and war, and which served the thought of his immediate predecessor to him for a presidential candidate, have continued to inspire him in his career as chief executive, and that history will accord to his administration the honors which are due an efficient, just, and courageous fulfillment of the public business, and will honor his interposition between the people and proposed partisan laws.

Eighth—We charge upon the Democratic party the heinous crime of treason, and that to obtain possession of the national and state governments, and of the control of place and position, they have obstructed all the efforts to preserve purity and conserve the freedom of suffrage, have devised fraudulent returns and certificates, have labored to unseat lawfully elected members of congress to secure at all hazards the vote of the majority of the states in the house of representatives, have endeavored to occupy by force and fraud places of trust given to others by the people of Maine, and rescued by the courage and action of Maine's patriotic sons, have by methods vicious in principle and tyrannical in practice attached partisan legislation to appropriation bills; have crushed the rights of individuals and violated the principles and sought the favor of rebellion against the nation and have endeavored to obliterate the sacred memory of the war to overcome its inestimable good results, freedom and individual equality.

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Eleventh—Amendment of the Burlingame treaty; no more Chinese immigration except for travel, education and foreign commerce, and therein carefully guarded.

Twelfth—Public money and public credit for public purposes solely, and not for such a change in the administration of this government as shall insure its genuine lasting reform in every department of the public service.

Thirteenth—We congratulate the country upon the honesty and thrift of the Democratic Congress which has reduced the public expenditure \$40,000,000 a year; upon the continuation of prosperity at home and the national honor abroad, and upon the uprightness of such a change in the administration of this government as shall insure its genuine lasting reform in every department of the public service.
