THE Rebel tug J. B. White, with a crew, from Norfolk, ran over to Newport News to-day, and surrendered. Sewall's Point is being evacuated. The Monitor and several gunboats have left for that point.

FORTRESS MONROE, May 10. Norfolk is extra, also Portsmouth and the Navy Yard. Gen. Wool, with a force of 5000 men, proceeded to Willow hvy Point on Friday night and effected a landing.

On Friday a superior force attacked Gen. Paine's division on the left wing. An engagement, which lasted an hour, ensued; the rebels received reinforcements, and Gen. Paine retired to Farmington. Our loss is stated at 1500 killed and wounded.

DESERTERS from a Louisiana regiment in the fight of Friday, just arrived, state that the rebel force making the attack on their left wing, on Friday night, was 35,000 strong, with thirty pieces of artillery, under Bragg, Van Dorn, Hardin and Price.
