Here are elergymen; let them give us the local items coun cted with their Churches and congregations. Here are physicians; let them us a word about the health or sickness of the community. Here are farmers; let them give us the news respecting crops, weather, etc. Here are the river men hem give us news about navigation, tides, cks and marine accidents. Here are hotel keepers ; let them give a sketch of incidents, or a list of arrivals at their hotels. Here are gay young men; let them keep us teachers; let them give us facts concerning schools. Here is the military ; let them fur nish us with facts they wish made public.

How much better for persons to spend a few hours in writing facts, not fancies, for the newspaper, than loading about some street corner, and talking insipid twaddle. Some object to writing, because they cannot write or compose well. That is the most immateranged by the state of the correct dates, names, places, and incidente, and we will dress them up. Don't abstain from writing be you cannot spell every word correctly.
