Trip from Skopawa Landing to Fort Stevens and back to Astoria. We thought we would visit Fort Stevens before our return. There had been a good road there till within a short time, but a storm succeeding the fire of the summer had blown the forest trees down in such numbers that the way was completely blocked.

Lieutenant A. K. Bush, Q. M. at Fort Stevens had worked the soldiers at that Post on it for more than a hundred days, but the storming played "smash" with all the improvements, and the only way of approach left was by the old way of the sea beach, when the tide is out. A man that travels this highway must watch the tides, or he may find himself in a snag between tide and high, timber covered banks.

Taking an early dinner provided by our excellent boat, Mr. Peace, we started out for the beach road. After rising a few rods, it set in to rain, but we turned out back, but progressed spite of the weather. The drops descended heavily, but we were too much of a Woodcock to be scared at that, and on we went.

Local Matters.

INTERNAL REVENUE.—Dr. Bailey, the supervising inspector of Internal Revenue on the Northern Pacific Coast, was in town during the past week to look after the interests of Uncle Sam generally, so far as connected with the Revenue Department. The creation of this office supplies a defect in the Revenue law that has been felt frequently by people who have suffered from the arbitrary and unjust acts and decisions of the Revenue Assessor and his Deputies, and who had no other remedy than to abide the slow process of the discrimination office for a return of their grievances, which was but seldom resorted to. An appeal now lies from the Assessor or Collector directly to the inspector, and we trust that the people hereafter will have less reason to complain of the official acts of inferior officials, who, through ignorance and occasional malice, have done much to render the Revenue law unpopular and burdensome to the people.

Clark county is bound to shine yet, you bet your bottom dollar. Mr. Lancaster was making a dash at the one of its discoveries, one that weighed one hundred and fifty pounds, and brought a place to rest. He thought it, at first, a log, afterwards discovering it was a ledge. There is a splendid water power near by. If the ledge proves good, "Black Tail Ledge" is a name it will henceforth bear.
