The leading article in your last week's issue is of more importance to the property holders of this city than any which has been present-to the public through your coluns. The real contestants are the Catholic Mis-

sion of St. James, the U. S. Miliary Reserve, the Town Site of Vancouver, a large portion of the Biers, a portion of the Short claim, and the claim of H. C. Morse.

I submit the facts upon which each claim-

The Mission claims the right to 640 acres of land, under a provise of the first section of the Organic Act of Oregon, passed Aug. 14, 1848; "That the title to the land not exceeding 640 acres, now occupied as Mis-sionary Stations among the Indian tribes in said Territory, together with the improvements thereon, be confirmed and established in the several religious societies, "to which said Missionary stations belong."
This was the first legislative action taken by Congress, relative to lands west of the Rocky

and Modeste Demeres, upon the written request of Dr. John McLaughlin, Chief Factor of the H. B. Co., came with the H. B. Co's. brigade of boats, and arrived here on the 24th of August, 1838. These priests were fed and cared for by the said Co., who also paid them £100 per annum. The Co. built a church, in which they ministered. That building, with the addition thereto, is the same in which they now minister. The fact upon which they rely to support their elaim is, that they were here as priests ministering in that church, August 14, 1848.
That building which was used as a church, and is now used by them as a church, was the property of the H. B. Co., and under their entire control. The avidance of which entire control. The evidence of which is that the Co., for a in ag period of time, leased the identical buildings to, and they were occupied by the officers of the U. S. Army, as tenants of the II, B. Co., which is conclusive proof that the pricets, when coupying

Rev. F. N. Blanchett, when examined as a witness on the part of the Mission, in answer to this question propounded by Amory Holbrook, Esq., "Can you tell when you first heard of the intention of the Bishop of Nisqually to claim this as a Mission Station?" answered, "I can't say. I was gone from 1855 to 1857, and don't recollect that I heard of it before I left." Rev. F. N. Blanchett was the first priest whe came to Oregon, and was the Bishop in 1844, having the same power that the present Bishop of Niaqually exercises now. 
