EDUCATE YOUR CHILDREN.

We lack one thing in our county. All the railroads gerging to one point, and that point lying within the bounds of Clark county, would not avail us, were we to move at our resent pace in the education of our children. I have had occasion to visit some of our districts, and to hear from others; and I am greatly astonished at the want of interest

manifested in this subject.

The sum promised our teachers is meagre crough-so much so as to induce only those who are new comers, or are temporarily out of regular employment to try the experiment of a county school. The inexperienced, by these means, are employed to impart that in-struction which alone age and experience are capable of giving. But to add to this precarious mode of living, the pittance of a sum is w.thheld until the teacher cal s; but he often calls in vain. Why is it that we must con-tinue this suicidal course? are our children of less value than our cattle? Shall we gradee the money paid out for the education of our sons and daughters, and pay out with a lavish hand for land and stock? Fathers, mothers, see to it, that the blame of an uneducated generation does not some after us to curse us for our neglect. Employ experienced teachers and pay them, that they may labor in love, and with the respect due them.



#### RAILROAD PROGRESS.

There is great a t vity in the mills and tope on the east side radgead. Everything There is great a twity in the mills and shope on the east side railrand. In and about the mills and shops one hundred and twenty-five men are employed, and the good weather we are now flaving is extremely favorable for the presention of the work. The two steam saw mills are being pushed to their utmost capacity. One of them is engaged exclusively upon ties, of which it cuts sufficient for half a mile of road per day. On Monday last, this mill sawed 1,640 ties, or enough for three-fitchs of a mile, amounting to \$2,000 feet of tumber. About fifty men are required to keep it at work. Is is intended to prepare at these mills all the ties, bridge timber and trestles which will be required for the road, at least as far as the Santiam. In the machine and car shops near East Portiand, work is going on brisally. 
