EASTERN NEWS

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The friends of Grinstead of New York are anticipating a change in the Cabinet. Last night they were urgently pressing him as Secretary of the Navy.

Commissioner Rollins, on the 6th, recommended to the President the immediate dismissal of John M. Binckley. The President today reported the matter to the Treasury, with the endorsement that the services of Binckley are no longer required by the Government, upon which Acting Secretary Hatley notified Binckley of his removal.

Secretary Washburne attended to his duties at the State Department to-day. A large number of Congressmen called. No changes yet announced in positions. The official notification of the acceptance of Washburne of the Secretaryship of State has been forwarded to each member of the resident diplomatic corps, with invitations to call on him as soon as convenient.

On March 9.—The *Truth* says the President has removed all the Pacific Railroad Commissioners except William Stewart. Stewart proposes to make an elaborate tour of all the interests and profits derived from his business during his term of office.

Union Republican County Convention.

The Union Republicans of Clark County, W. T., are requested to meet at the voting places in their respective precincts, at two o'clock, p. m., on Saturday, the 10th day of April, A. D., 1899, and then there elect delegates to the Union Republican County Convention, which is hereby called to assemble at Vancouver, W. T., on Wednesday, the 14th day of April, 1899, at 10 o'clock, a. m., to elect four delegates to the Union Republican Territorial Convention which will assemble at Clatskanie, on Tuesday, the 20th day of April, 1899, and to transact such other business as the Convention shall deem proper.

The different precincts of Clark County will be entitled to the following representation in the County Convention, to wit: Vancouver Precinct, 13 delegates; Pollock, 3; Lancaster, 4; Patterson, 3; Luckman, 4; Preston, 2; Washougal, 2; Fern Prairie, 2; Battleground, 1; Chelatchie, 1.

The Central Committee of this County recommend that all persons who will pledge themselves to support the Union Republican ticket for Territorial and County officers at the ensuing general election, be allowed to participate in the primary election to be held as aforesaid. ST. PATRICK'S DAY CELEBRATION.—The various Irish organizations of this city and Vancouver will join in celebrating St. Patrick's Day, this year, with becoming honors, and judging from the advertised arrangements already made, the celebration will be conducted on a grander scale than any of its predecessors. There is to be a procession composed of the Vancouver and Portland Irishmen Benevolent Societies, the Emmet Guard, the Fenian Guard, and Irish citizens generally; appropriate ceremonies at the Catholic Church; an oration at Oro Fino Hall; a collation at the White Deer House; and a ball in the evening under the auspices of the Irishmen Benevolent Society, at the Washington Guard's Armory.
