TURNING MILE INTO BUTTER.—Our readers have doubtless read of a wonderful process by which the entire milk placed in a churn is converted into butter. The inventor patented the process, and is now offering to sell rights for States and counties. It has been tested in this city in the presence of respectable citizens, and found to do all that is prumised for it. Of course, we don't pretend to know of what the patented process counsists, but a correspondent of the American Institute Farmers' Club says he has known how to produce the same result for years. He says the process is this:

"Three pints of milk, fresh from the cow, or any sailk, if fresh; put it in a stose chars

Ho was to produce the same result for years. He sags the process is this:

"Three pints of milk, fresh from the cow, or any milk, if fresh; put it in a stone charn—it is best to use the old-fashioned dasher—add three pellows of eggs, set the churn is a pail if hot water till you get, the mess lakewarm or at a blood heat, and about two minutes will turn the whole thing into batter, leaving no milk. It looks more like magic than anything I ever saw, It must be thoroughly churned after it has come to butter, or it will incline to go back to milk. I have no thermometer, and do not know what degree of heat is best. I wrote you a letter four years since about this, and did not send it because I was afraid it would be a detriment to butter dealers and consumers, as they might get inferior butter on their hands. If properly made, I think it a good thing."

We hope our lady readers will give it a trial and advise us of the result.—S. F. Dispatch.

DARIEM CANAL TREATY.—The treaty negotiated by Caleb Cushing with the government of Columbia concedes to the United States the exclusive right to construct an inter-oscanic canal across the Isthmus of Darien at any point that may be selected by the United States. The Columbian government concedes six miles of land on each side of the canal, half for its own benefit and the other for those undertaking the construction. The Columbian government is to receive ten per cent. of the net profits, the treaty to be ratified by the United States. The surveys are to be mude two years after ratification, the canal to begin in five years and to be finished in fifter eyears after the ratification, otherwise the charter fails. The charter is to run 100 years, and the canal to be under the control of the United States. Congress is to fix the rate of toil and the averigation is to be open to all nations in time of peace, but closed to beligerates who may seek to avail themselves of its advantages. It is estimated that the canal will cost \$100,000,-000. A company was formed in the city of New York, with Peter Cooper as President. It is ead, on distinguished authority, that this company is ready to commence the work. Congress is however at liberty to give the preference to this or any other private company, or the United States can itself—indertake the construction of the canal.

To Parvent Election Frauda.—The bill requiring Washington and Idaho Territories to hold their elections on the same 'day that the elections are held in this State, has been reported back from the Committee on Territories, by Senator Williams, with a recommendation that the bill pass. The passage of such a bill is demanded to prevent illegal voting in the Territories, and in this State. ED. REGISTER :

Sir :- In your very excellent paper of Feb-ruary 27th, is a communication from T. J. Fletcher, setting forth the flattering prospects of a Railfoad from East Portland to Washougal. Mr. F. is very sanguine that the East side Railroad will cross there. Well, queer thinge do sometimes occur, both in natur, and in art; but it strikes me that this age is a little too shrewd, too calculating, ah! too selfish and too wise to even dream of being decoyed from a straight line over good ground. to a circuitous route over worse ground, and more than double the distance; the alcaptandum sophistry and eccentric speculation of Mr. F. to the contrary notwithstanding.

We will then suppose that the expense of bridging the Columbia at Washougal, or at Vancouver, will be the same. From East Portland to Vancouver is six miles; from miles; Fortland to Washengel, is sixteen miles; a difference of ten miles.
