That will inevitably be the case wherever a similar law is passed. Laborers may "atrike" and refuse to work; but so they may, and do now, against hw wages or long time; but it mekes no difference. They work now for the market rate of wages, not because they little it, but because they must, or starre—and they will do the same thing then. It is curious to see how much time and labor is wisted in efforts and ow what can't be done—to shangly things by changing their names. Politeians are constantly trying this.
