In all honcety, consist-cy and fairness, Congress is bound to grant NORTHERN, all the facilities it did the CENTRAL Railroad Company. Congress is asked to do no more, in honor it can do no less. Equal justice has thus far been denied; be tardily granted; but the northern people are now determined that the road shall be constructed. Northern Railroed Surveys.—By a private dispatch from San Francisco to Mr. Jared S. Hurd of this place, we lears that our old townsman, Major Tilton, now Chief Bagineer of the Northern Pacific Railroad, is on his way to this Terly, for the purpose of exploring and surveying the several passes through the Cascade Mountains, with a view of determining the minst practicable route for reaching Puget Sound with the great Northern Pacific Railroad. The Major telegraphic from San Francisco, that he will leave for this region in a few days, and will proceed at once to examine the several routes as stated, which, it is supposed will occupy about three months. This looks like business; and if the present Congress, as is hoped, shall extend to the Company the desired aid, the work on the Northern Pacific Railroad may commence early next spring. We understand Mr. Hurd will take charge of a party of surveyors and explorers, as an assistant to the Major.—Pucific Tribune.

We are informed, that this lessne man, a Mr. T. W. Hays, is a bone fide resident of the State of Oregon, and that he was only temporarily engaged in business in Yakima county. Again, we do not understand, how the keepers of the asylum at Monticello took him in at the expense of the Territory; supposing that he was a resident of Yakima county, unless he had been first duly examined by the Probate Judge of that county and committed by his order. The Probate Judge of Cowlits county could certainly take no jurisdiction. The interests of the Territory require, that these matters should be looked into.

State Rights had been actually promulgated and disloyalty had been actually taught. The following statistics taken from the Army and Navy Journal tell a different tale:

At the breaking out of the war there were in the Ragular Army 820 officers, graduates of West Point. Of these 330 were from slavebulding States; out of this 330, 133 took up arms for the Union. In what other cass of Southern men could any such proportion of loyalty be found? Representatives, Senators, Supreme Cont Judges, Cabinet Ministers—how many Southern men were there among those who remained loyal? How much this large average of loyalty among the Southern graduates of West Point was due to West Point influence is proved by the fact that out of over two handred Southerners who were officers in the Regular Army, but not West Point graduates, not half a dozen remained loyal? Such figures as these need no comment. Of the 490 West-Point graduates from non-slaveholding States, fifteen took up arms on the side of the rebels, and four more were known to aympathize with socsession. In 1801 there were in the Regular Army, 1,200 officers. At the end of the war 181 of them were dead; 500 had been severely wounded and in hospitals—many have aince died in consequence of their wounds; more than one of two killed or wounded.

RANIB -- A SUBSTITUTE FOR COTTON .- The New Orleans Picayune gives the following account of a new plant:

New Orleans Picayune gives the following account of a new plant:

A new plant has been added to our tropic al and sent tropical region—a new textile, which will furnish the world with efothing and the means of knowledge. We have seen within a few days long skeins of a committee fibre (eaten like in whiteness, and fineness, but much stronger) which is now produced at the rate of five crops per year in the State of Vera Crox. Mexico, where it has been cultivated for five years by a Belgian naturalish and botanist, who went tiere to pursue this favorite studies and occupations in a soil and elimate which favor them.

This plant, called Ramie, is a native of Java; was introduced thence into the Jardin the Finnies at Parls by some French accuration 1844; was regarded then as simply exhibiting the wooderful advantages of the tropics, being too delicate for open air cultures so old climates. But having been tried in warmer climates than that of France, yet not so equatorial as that of Java, it has been found to do as well in them.

Eight hundred pounds of fine to the acre is to be expected from each cutting of full growth in far land. The culture is similar to that of cane; but as the plant, when wose set is hard to cradicate, grows rigorously, and defies the influence of grass or rival weeds, cultivation is only needed to promote tag growth. Under these circumstances we may safely pronounce that Ramie will, at an early day, take a high rank among our staplas.

RECEIPT FOR MAKING "PERFECT BREAD."
Sift five posseds of good flower and put it in

Take two pointors the size of the first, boilt them, mash and mix with balf a pint or boiling water. A freely yeast cake, of the size common in the market, is dissolved in water, and the two solutions mixed together

Source one or more of them, seeing a rat quite at home in the midst of plenty, will enter the trap without any suspicion of harm. Next morating, pump or pour water over the trap to clean it, and to make the killing of your prey more cass. Have an empty barrel into which drup the content of your cage; the prisoners being well soaked, will be so heavy and slow that you can easily knock them on the head.
