Underground Telegraphy

Engineers have been for a long time anxious to discover some means of laying tele-graph wires beneath the earth's surface, as air lines are liable to be broken, are influence ed by atmospheric effects, and may be "tap transmission of messages. A great obstacle to underground telegraphy has been the difficulty of insulating the wires. Outta percha and iron tubes are two expensive. Mr. Don ald Nicoll exhibits, at the Paris Exposition, a system of telegraph wires in which very perfect insulation and practical indestructa-bility are provided. The wires, as prepared and insulated under the new system, can be laid in considerable numbers and fixed by unskilled labor. They may be laid in trench es formed by an ordinary sub soil plow in my description of soil, or in the slit and mud of the sea shore or rivers. When so placed, the wires are not affected by the pressure of the earth upon them, and they have the ad vantage of being not only secure, but secret, for their course can only be discovered when laid by those who possess the key to the route The prepared wires may be laid between the rails on a railway, or will do their work with equal efficiency in the depths of a line of sewers. The rapidity with which the wires can be laid is such that twenty miles of sec tions, containing fifty wires, could be laid in one day by thirty laborers. There is no re-striction as to the number of wires which may be laid at one operation .- Am. Journal.

THADDEUS STEVENS' GRAVE. - The Lancaster (Penn.) Express says: Several years ago, when the Lancaster Cemetery was incorporated, Mr. Stevens purchased two lots, for which a deed was duly executed. Some years later, in looking over his papers, he oticed for the first time the clause prohibiting the interment of colored people in the cemetery. [From the Daily Oregonian.] Advantages of the Columbia River Rout PORTLAND, August 26th, 1867.

I have long held the opinion that the valley of the Columbia afforded the best route for the location of a trans-continental railway in the United States I now think it no merely the best, but regard it as the only one on which such a road can be built that wil fulfill the requirements of our own country and those portions of the old world which it

is intended to accommodate.

I have been a year along the Rue of the
Central Pacific Railroad in California, and have had good opportunities for estimating the ultimate utility of a road by that route It is enriching the owners, and will become valuable adjunct to the mines of Nevada: but in the primary expectations concerning its usefulness, generally entertained, I re gard it as a failure. Previous to the commencement of last win-

ter, the construction was completed from Sac

ramento to Circo, a distance of 90 miles-

twenty of them lying within the deep snow

of the Sierra Nevadas. The leading men of the company having it in charge partly, I suppose, from personal ambition but chiefly I presume because they regarded the result as a test that would effect the val ue of their bonds, proclaimed that the road should be kept open the whole distance during the winter, regardless of any expense which might be incurred thereby. residents of the mountainous region universally predicted that it would prove to be an impossibility. The railroad company spared no effort which unlimited supplies of money, means and material might effect, and failed to accomplish their purpose. They are now ousing in the road through the deep snewbelt, which will, when completed to the eastera boundary of Colifornia, embrace about forty five miles of its length. This is an impracticable remedy. The utmost vigilance and precaution cannot entirely protect so long a line so cituated and so much ex posed, from fire during the dryness; and in winter it will be crushed by the great weight of snow, or in many places be entirely swept away by the frequent avalanches which plung with irresistible force down the precipitou sides of the mountains, on which the road is located. During one quarter of each year the running of trains on this ronte must inevitably be entirely suspended, or so frequently and seriously interrupted as to render el or transportation thereon entirely unreliable during that period. This certainly will not satisfy the expectations of the people who are paying for the construction, nor the wants of the world-wide commerce which it is intended to accommodate. There are some persons who insist that the Central will eventually be superceded by the extreme Southern route, but that can never be. A traffic of such magnitude as that in contemplation, cannot be successfully prosecuted by means country so utterly arid and with a climate so excessively hot, as will necessarily intervene by any Southern route North of Mexico. Where the Columbia cuts the Cascade Range is the proper route for the Atlantic and Pa cific railway; and there, in time, it will sure y come. The great enterchange of wealth between the two hemispheres, the control of which all commercial nations have eagerly sought, will yet pass through the valley of the Oregon. DISCOVERY OF A STONE COFFIN AND SKELE borers were employed in ballasting on the works of the North Lindon Railway, near the new station at Old Ford, they can a large stone coffin, which lay some 24 feet from the surface of the ground. After clear ing away the earth from around it, the lid was raised, and the coffin was found to contain a perfect skeleton, the teeth being in a state of preservation. On being exposed to he air, however the rib bones other portions of the frame slightly parted. The coffin is about 7 feet in lewith, two feet four inches in width. There is no inscript ion or figures upon it-at least none could be traced; but it is considered that it must have been buried many centuries back. It is formed out of one piece of stone, the inside having been hewn or chipped out. The lid is two or three inches in thickness, and the top is rounded off. The spot where the coffin was found is close to the old Roman road, which was the high road from Middlesz in Essex, over the old ford of the river Lea which was formerly of greater dimension than at present. A number of old coins and urns, have also been turned up in the course of the excavations about the railway, and some two or three years since another coffin was discovered in the upper part of Old Ford. After a good deal of exertion the railway men succeeded in removing the stone to a neighboring hut by the side of the line, where it has been seen by some hundreds of persons.

There are now in this county two or more educational institutions of a higher grade to "Holy Angels' College," and the Female School taught by the Sisters of Charity, and also to the "Vancouver Seminary" which has lately been started under very auspicious cirwell calculated to supply our educational wants. Each of them have a distinct legitimate sphere, in which they may carry their operations. The success of one does not destroy the prospects of the other. If conscientious religious scruples will not allow which is under the charge of this or that religique denomination, there need be no necessity of sending them abroad to receive their ation. They can now be accommodated at home. We do not write this for the purpose of praising this or detracting from the merits of that institution. They are all worthy of being well patronised. Inasmuch as all of them are comparatively young and requiring the active aid and counterance of our people, we samply desire at this time to impress upon our readers the necessity of supporting them liberally. Experience has nstrated, that in this Territory our common school system is entirely inadequate to supply the most ordinary educational wants. Experience has further demonstrated, that a locality which can boast of a first class edu-cational institution, is also distinguished by the pressure of a class of people having a literary taste, and possessing all the moral and social qualities, which go to make up a many of our people seem to have an idea that the removal of the Territorial capital would be of greet hapefut to this place. We are not of that place, for beyond the residence of a few federal officials and the hiennial gathering of the members of the Legislature, who receive a starving rulary, there is nothing t bring prosperity to a place, whereat the capital is located, beyond the mere prestige of be ing known as the "seat of Government." Others think that the removal of the military establishment from this place would be the death knell to this town. Of course, if we could have the sent of government located bere and could retain for all time to come the extensive patronage now given to our people by the military authorities in the way of furnishing many supplies, our future prosperity well assured. But we place far more importance upon the growth and expanupon the above mentioned sources of prosperity. There are many families in this Territory now sending their children to California and Oregon to be educated. This i not as it should be. We have one of the most beautiful towns on the Pacific coast ; scenery that cannot be surpassed, and a climate that cannot be excelled. The initiatory steps have been taken to establish schools, that can gradually be transformed into institutions of learning of the highest order. They belong to different religious denominations and we regret to see in certain quarters a disposition eropping out, to impair the usefulness of the ols by misrepresentations and impeding their growth by discouraging the citizens from patronizing them. This feeling is not manifested by the parties directly interested but by some of their indiscreet friends .-There should be no rivaly between them. There is a splendid field for each to operate in and we sincerely hope, that our citizens . sy profit by the example of the citizens of Santa Clara in California and of Salem Ore gon, both of which places are prominent on the Pacific coast for the excellent character of their schools and a class of population having good morals, being refued in their tastes and habits ag ! enjoying quiet, substantial and permanent prosperity. Let us all put our shoulder to the wheel and give with a liberal hand our contributions in aid of our schools, and above all, let not the spirit of envy and narrow minded prejudice induce us to retard the progress of an enter-prize having for its object he thorough education of our youth.

RECIPE TO CLEAN WOOL .- Hunt Bros. the North Bloomfield Custom Woolen Mill, New York, give the following recipe for cleaning wool? To two patterns of water add a quart of soft map and a belf-pint of common salt. Heat from 150" to 180", or n little warmer than the hand can bear. Put in all the wool that will stir conveniently, and let it remain fifteen minhtes, moving it in the kettle occasionally. Then take it out, let it drain, veture the drained liquor to the kettle and add all the water needed. Reneat the process, and occasionally add a little soap After the wool is drained sufficient ly, simply riese it out well in cold water and you will then have it white and soft. Never let wool beil in the liquor, as that will fix the gum, reader the fibre stiff and gray, and unfit it for soft and unflexitle yarn. Fine wool needs more time in the kettle than course. Toggins may be claused in the same manner, by clipping off all the hard matter that cannot readily be compressed between the thumb and finger-

Rules von Cow Management Cows should run dry six weeks before calving; it milked closely toward calving, the calves will be poor. A cow newly come in should not ately warm slop. Calves, intended for raising, should be taken from the cow within a in i few days, and they will be less liable to suck when they are old. Feel them first on new milk for awhite, then skim-mik taking once that all the changes are gradual, by adding only a porcha at first. Hearty enters are destrable for cours, and may usually be see dainty cow. Heifers dried up too early after calving, will always run dry about the same time in after years-therefore, be careful to milk closely the first year, until about six weeks before calving. Spring cows should come in while they are yet fed on bay, and before they are turned to grass, which will he more likely to prevent caked bag and milk
