Oregon Labor Exchange.

Report of the Secretary of the Board of Statistics, Immigration and Labor Exchange for Oregon,

|Submitted at a meeting of the Trustees,

held Sept. 24, 1869. Pertland, Sept. 23, 1869.

To the President and Trustees of the Boar of Statistics, Immigration and Labor Exdange for O egon :

GENTLEMEN-In compliance with instructions from your Executive Committee, I viss ited 3an Francisco for the purpose of examining nto the practical workings of the Labor Exhange in operation there.

A scrap book is kept in which are pasted elippings from newspapers and pamphlets of a statistical nature, circulars issued by like associations in other States, and general matters of that kind. Beyond this the Aussociation has taken no steps to provide for the compilation of the statistics of the Stateall information of that kind contained in their pamphlets and circulars being obtained from the Surveyor General's office at Sacramento at the opening of each session of the Legislature.

No plan has been adopted for obtaining and preserving maps or plats of the public lands, or for obtaining information of the lacation of private lands for sale or rent, and an immigration in San Francisco in search of lands must go to the real estate agancies of the city to obtain what information be It was at first intended that the Labor Exchange should take hold systematically of this matter of statistics and lands, but the idea was aftewards abandoned.

Some efforts have been made by the Labor Exchange to induce immigration into California by the distribution of pamphlets, and circulars through the Eastern States and Euthe State, the rate of wages, cost of living and other information likely to interest im migrants. Measures were taken to distribute translations of these pamphiets through the American Consuls at Germany and French

The Association is supported in the main by the business men of San Francisco-each ember paying annually ten dollars as a condition of membership, and dues of one dollar per month. The expenses of conduct ing the business am gets to about five hun dred bollars per month, exclusive of printing expenses.
In addition to the Labor Exchange I vis.

ed another institution in operation, at San Francisco, called the "California Immigration Assosiation"-a private society, consists ing, from what I could learn; of but a few persons. Their business is managed by an agent. As the society is not a public one, I could not, of course, make many inquiries about its organization or mode of doing business; but the agent kindly furnished me with some valuable information in regard to the system of obtaining and keeping records public and private lands in the State. #### Independent Movements.

WASHINGTON

San Francisco is not the only city in which the people are rebelling against the corruption of party organizations. Chicago has taken a leaf from our note book, and is forming an Independent party for the coming election, When we consider, however, the long suffering patience of communities in this country, thought suggests itself that we have a good deal of work to do before we can claim anything like perfection for our political institutions. The machinery by which evils are remidied at present is about as clumsy and wasteful as well could be. A certain party rides into power on the shoulders of some nationlissue. For a time things go well, but presently the possession of influence brings about abuse of it, and corruption and melfensance become the order of the day. The press is always the first to detect the growing demoralization, and as a rule it does its duty in warning the public. But what is everybody's business is nobody's busine-s. The strictures of the opposition are attributed to malice and envy, and if the party organs are bold enough to denounce dishonesty in the ranks of their friends, it is assumed that they have been slighted in some way, and are actuated by a spirit of revenge. In the means time the corrupt men steal their fill, and laugh at the people. The latter certainly deserve to be laughed at, for they neglect their own interests in a way that, if carried out in their The latter certainly deserve own private concerns, would soon bring them to bankruptey. And so the matter goes on for years. One set of plunderers succeeds an other, and when the burdens of taxation, etc., stendily increase, the masses content themselves with abusing the rogues who in realirope, containing statistics of the productions ty hold their offices on the sufferance of their victims; When the community has been ficeced right and left for four or five years, the people begin to think that they have borne this state of things long enough, and they rise, shake themsives, combine temporarily, and thrust out the thieves. This done, they usually relapse into their former apathy, and suffer matters to go on until the new set of officials become also corrupt, and the who affair is repeated. It may be a very salisfactory thing to know that the people are capable of being stirred up to a realization of heir position, once in ten years or so, and that they then show their determination to bave pure men in office, But to our thinking paid that steady and constant attentson to public affairs which would insure the faithful and honest administration of the government at all times. 
