REPORT OF ENOCH G. ADAMS, GRAND LECTURER TO THE GRAND LODGE I. O. O. G. T., OF OREGON AND WASHINGTON TERRITORY.

We have taken the liberty of publishing the following, as even the general reader and those unconnected with Good Templars, adventures happening as these did, in weather the roughest ever known on this coast, and in a part of the country sparsely settled, must be of interest:

After much difficulty I entered upon the trail, and proceeded on through the wilderness. I rode for some time. At last I met a Frenchman, an Indian and a squaw, with three or four Indian ponies, heavily laden.

to pass the mighty barrier of the huge fallen giant of the forest. I lost myself—I lost my path—I lost my horse, and night was coming on!

No sounds save roaring waters, cry of birds and howls, and the forest with the swooping of its huge limbs, sounding like the hum of a vast factory or like the far off booming of ocean surf on the rocks. At last I came to the Willoupa. It ran like a cataract. I was very weak.

The next morning I started on my journey, and found a very pleasant man, and under his simple exterior, a heart of gold.

From the Indian I learned that the Willoupa was a very beautiful spot, and that the water was very pure.

Washington County, Oregon.

THE ELECTION. The Great Triumph! Peace is Secured! Grant and Colfax receive Two-Thirds of the Electoral Votes, Democracy receives its Quietum, THE END OF REBELLION.

The real battle of the campaign was fought in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana on the 12th October. Since then the only question has been as to how large the majority for Grant and Colfax would be.

The returns received up to a late hour last night give us increased hope that we have carried the State. We append a table showing the Republican gains so far heard from.

Every county so far show very satisfactory Republican gain. The Democratic majority in the State last June was 1,199. It will be seen that more than three-fourths of this majority has already been overhauled.
