Absence of Mind.

Declared to be a Sign of Incipient Dementia.

It is essential to skill that the muscles

of the body should work unobscuredly,

but the moment they assert, as it were,

their independence of self-consciousness,

and prompt the initiation of efforts out

side of what they have been taught, a

diseased condition is begun which we call

"absence of mind." Such a habit begins

in little things, more generally by an

omission than a commission. Thinking

of something else while crossing a part

of a street, the wronged necktie is

forgotten, the crooked coat is put on,

and the hair is unkempt.

Soon as the habit increases, absurd and

even harmful acts are committed. The

collection of anecdotes are full of such

folly. We know of an able young law-
yer who instead of pouring a tonic from a

bottle on his desk, carefully emptied the

ink from his inkstand into a spoon and

swallowed it. Another, an ex-Army

General of the United States, went on

a fortnight trip to attend an absorbing

legal case. His wife packed half a dozen

shirts in his portmanteau. On his return

there were no shirts visible. Pushing

her inquiries she found that her husband

had regularly a clean shirt every

other day, but had forgotten to

take off the soiled one. It was not until

wearing the whole half dozen! An au-
thentic anecdote of the great political

economist, Adam Smith, tells us that

when called upon to sign a contract, in-
stead of writing his own name he made

an elaborate imitation of the signature

of the other party which had already

been affixed.

Such incidents tend to depreciate a

man, though perhaps unjustly, in the

opinion of those with whom he does bus-
iness. They become also a grave annoy-
ance to the individual himself. In a

large number of cases, however, which

seem to be of a certain degree, pass into

mental diseases. Senility and infamy are

not infrequently marked by automatic

actions, carried out without the will or

consciousness of the doer. The absent-

minded one, like the sleep-walker, per-
forms actions without the knowledge of

them, and neglects duties which are

pressing.

Justly, therefore, it is a source of anxi-
ety with every thoughtful person when

he finds himself falling into such

habits, and he usually gradual in

its onset, stealing over one in moments

London Letter.

Interesting to Farmers.—European Agri-
cultural News Items.

(Regular Correspondence.)

LONDON, ENGLAND, Dec. 16th, 1880.

With frosts at the early part of last

week, and heavy rains and unsettled

weather to its close, there has been but

little progress made with wheat sowing

in the late districts, whilst frosts alter-
nating with rains kept the lands in a very

wet condition. There has been a rather

more liberal offering of home-grown sam-
ples in the London market during the

week, but there is no improvement to

note in respect to condition. At Mark

Lane, on Monday, the value of dry sam-
ples of English wheats was generally in

advance of the quotations of the pre-
vious week, in sympathy with the some-
what excited tone of the foreign trade.

There was, however, no improvement in

the demand for inferior samples. On

Wednesday, the demand for breadstuffs

was of quite a normal character, and

Friday's market closed dull, both for

wheat and flour. In most of the provin-
cial exchanges values for breadstuffs have

improved, but the market has closed with

signs of weakness throughout the trade.

The trade in foreign breadstuffs has un-
dergone a considerable fluctuation during

the past week. On Monday, there was

some little excitement on account of the

closing of the canal traffic in the United

States by ice, locking up some 10,000,000

bushels of wheat. The values of floating

cargoes were enhanced 1s. to 2s. a qr.,

according to their position, and the tone

of the United States markets tended to

disorganize the market here. On

Tuesday and Wednesday the arrivals of

wheat-laden vessels off coast, together

with the invisible supply of wheat in the

United States, caused a reaction in the

market, and from that time down to the

close of the week, the position of

holders has been slowly but surely weak-

ening, and the cable advices of lower

rates at the Atlantic seaboard have caused

the trade to close dull, and decidedly in

favor of buyers.

In Germany the whole of the grain

trade has been fluctuating during the

week, and at Berlin wheat has recovered

a depression which was attributed to specu-
lative transactions. At Hamburg rates for

barley were firmly supported, and

barley was in better demand. At

Sterling barley has met with a duller

demand. In France, the course of the

grain trade has been much in accord-
ance with that on the English exchanges.
