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ENGLISH STYLES & FASHIONS.

The Etiquette of Knocks and Pronunciation. "By the way, you are aware, I suppose, that England, next to Germany, is the most formal country in Europe."

Yes. At least more so than Spain is at present. Etiquette pervades everything; and it is by the observance or otherwise, in its smallest details, that the Englishmen form their opinion of strangers.

Yes, it is. And, moreover, an Englishman will form an unfavorable estimate of you if you do not understand these details. There's the same rigidity in other directions.

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ALTHOUGH judgment has not been given in the suit of the Countess Lambertini to establish her claim as the daughter of the late Cardinal Antonelli there seems to be little doubt in Rome that the decision will be against her.

NEW PAPER.—We have received the first and second issues of the Pendleton Independent, a new candidate for public favor. This paper is understood to be started in the interest of Senator Mitchell, and most likely will be continued until the close of the campaign.

TREMBLING.—The fraudulent president is still haunted by fears of a disclosure of the secrets of the Louisiana returning board. If the collectorship of the port of New Orleans will purchase Packard's silence, civil service reform of the Hayes' pattern would involve no obstacle. Packard is a leaky vessel and needs calking.

WITHOUT FOLLOWERS.—The New York Times, radical, says: For, disguise it as we may, the ugly fact is that we have an administration without a following in the senate and therefore without the means of influencing the deliberations of that body. Republicans are alienated, and even the Southern democrats are reconciled imperfectly, if at all.

CONGRATULATED.—Judge Mackey, of South Carolina, who recently recommended a clearing-house for crime, or substantially, that felony should become a matter of "book account," has telegraphed his congratulations to Senator Patterson, on his release from Jimbo, under the late decision of Judge Humphreys. This is all very proper and commendable.

STANLEY ON THE WAY HOME.—Stanley telegraphs from Aden his arrival there from Zanzibar and his departure for Suez, so that he will be in England in a very short time, where he will be lionized, perhaps, more enthusiastically than he was when he returned successful from the search of Livingston.

GENERAL BUTLER HAS at last broken his long silence on the political situation. He discusses the tariff, the finances, the silver scheme, the Southern question, the cabinet, the president's policy and the next presidential election in a characteristic way. The president, he declares, must decide before February which party he will join—the republican or democratic—and change his cabinet. There are prospects of lively times in Washington.

REMOVED FROM OFFICE.—The high sheriff of Butler county, Pennsylvania, has been removed from office and debarred forever from holding public office in that State, for bribery. Had the same penalty been imposed in the case of Simon Cameron forty years ago, his days would have since been passed in the retirement of obscure and disgraceful private life. The remark will apply to most of the Pennsylvania politicians in office during the last sixteen years.

SECRETARY EVARTS is said to be of opinion that Diaz would be much stronger if he had not the northern Mexican States on his hands, and that the only hope for Mexico is to lose those States, which would enable its government to act more energetically over a much smaller territory. But he acknowledges that popular opinion here is opposed to annexation, and he wishes Providence would somehow turn the whole northern Mexican States into an impassible and uninhabitable desert.

DUTY OF THE CITIZEN.—Rev. Dr. Dale says: I think it possible that the time may come when men who refuse to vote will be subjected to church discipline, like men who refuse to pay their debts. The plea that the discharge of political duty is inconsistent with the maintenance of spirituality ought to be denounced as a flagrant piece of hypocrisy. It is nothing else. The men who urge it are not too spiritual to make a cup in cotton or coffee. Although they profess to be alarmed at the spiritual perils of the ballot-box, and of an occasional hour in a political committee room, they are not afraid that their spirituality will suffer if they spend eight hours every day in their store or counting-house. Their spirituality is of such a curious temper that it receives no harm from its pursuits—no matter how secular—by which they can make money for themselves; but they are afraid of most disreputable consequences if they attempt to render any service to their country. The selfishness of these men is as contemptible as their hypocrisy.

UNNECESSARILY EXCITED.—One is very much amused in contemplating the attitude of England towards the Russo-Turkish war. She wants to strike, but hesitates to give the blow. Russia, observant of this hesitancy, pursues a dignified course, neither inviting mediation in the war nor denying that she would entertain overtures of peace, but that they must come from Turkey herself and no third party. Evidently this would be the proper course, as there would then be no room for a misunderstanding, behind which Turkey might desire to trench herself, on the plea that the negotiations were not of her seeking, and that their violation would, therefore, be no breach of faith. As between the two powers—England and Russia—public admiration cannot help being with the latter. There is really no apparent cause to the balance of the world which England should feel so much apprehension for the safety of her India possessions in the event of a Russian triumph over the Turk. She is caring needless trouble. It will be time enough for her when some overt act is committed by Russia looking to such a purpose, and her solicitude in the meantime seems out of place.

FOREIGN REVIEW.—The past year has been a memorable one for Europe; less, however, for the gravity of the events it has brought forth, than for the importance of the issues it has opened up. The Eastern question, that bugbear of diplomacy, has at last escaped control. With it the equally perplexed theory of the balance of power has gone to pieces; and, despite all the efforts of statesmen, and all the advice of publicists, it is clear that radical changes, not only in the map of Europe, but in the relative positions of leading powers, are not merely possible but probable. The quarrel now proceeding between Turkey and Russia is indeed so broad in its implications that it is quite capable of entangling half the governments of Europe in its consequences; and the jealousies, ambitions, and capacities of several powers may at any time interfere, either to prevent the negotiation of a treaty which would afford some guarantees for the peace of Europe, or to spread the flames of war far beyond their present limits. To these dire contingencies and other considerations are necessarily subordinate. It is useless to think of the victories of industry, invention, art, and commerce, while half the habitable globe trembles under the apprehension of war and desolation, because of the reckless policy of a few scores of intriguing rulers.

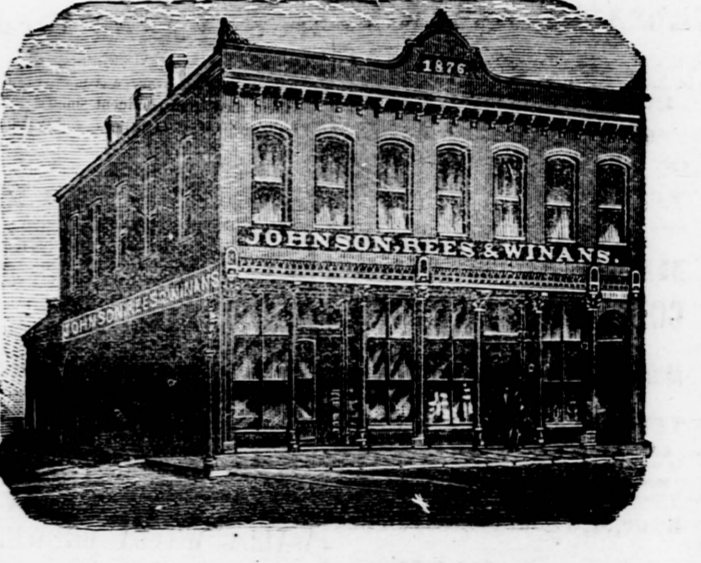
