THE AMERICAN HOUSE OF LORDS

It is frequently a matter of comment and an argument against the creation of any more small states, that any man with plenty of money and aspirations Rhode Island and Nevada, and securfor himself the highest office in the gift of the people. Our National Senate is an aristocracy of wealth and the ten dency to make it more and more exclusive, though contrary to the ethics of a Republican form of government, is evidently stronger than party. Hitherto, in less than four hours, and on the present the wealth of the Senate has been largely occasion, owing to a bijzzard of a snow the wealth of the Senate has been largely composed of Republican Senators, but it is now notorious that the Democracy of so great a State as Ohio, has, in the case of Payne, the Standard oil man, sold its highest office to the highest bidder for cash-to a ... who represents the most odious monor dy in the country, a hard money man, a National bank man, and a protective tariff man-a man it every leading respect the opposite of every principle that has been inscribed on Dem-

ocratic banners for the past ten years. The original idea that sought expre ion in the Senate among the farmers of the Federal constitution, was to make that body a place of retirement .to those men whose lives had been spent in the public service, and were on the down-hill past the meridian of lite, men of large experience for counsel, men whose wide reputation was a security against their a andonment of principles on which their fame rested. In short, the Senate, as originally designed, was to be an aristocracy of intellect, of men of large talents who should concentrate in themselves the wisdom of their states, in contradistinc tion to a member of the lower house, who merely represents a congressional district. The Roman Senate was the ma terialised representative of this theory. made up as it was of all those who had grst held the highest office of the Re-

public by election. But the fact shows that the theory ha been sadly perverted. Our Senators are not, as a rule, men who have spent their lives in public affairs. They are not on an average, any older men than repre sentatives. They are remarkable solely for their wealth, and through their money men get into the Senate who could not as easily get into the house of Representa tives. In making the election of Senators depend upon the legislatures of the States it was supposed that it would be aring the new mines to Leadville camp and lodged in hands that would insure the election of only the fittest and best, but it turns out that a man of wealth always prefers to operate on a small, select body

larger constituency. And unfortunately, our Senate has ecame not only a representative of the wealth, but very largely of the corporate wealth of the count 2. Some are called Republicans and some Democrats, but below these surface scratches these men represent very much the same. Some are the avowel agents of gigantic monop olies, none have the welfare of the people at heart and all affect to consider themselves superior to the mandates of public opinion. They are not of the people and they do not represent the people. It is a serious blemish in the Federal constitution that needs close and

partner and myself made an early start to cross the divide which humps itself as a wagon wheel between Beaver and Pritchard creek. These creeks are distant from each other only eight miles, but the trip is rarely made storm prevailing, nearly six hours were consumed in the journey. I have since known as many days to have been spont unsuccessfully in attempting to break the snow blockade over the same trail. We left the flat at an early hour and ascended Trail creek, a tributary of B aver, over a fairly level but desperately muddy trail for two mil 3, and the divide. 


