Sec. 2. Any person having charge of any horse, or mule, or team, who shall penint the same to stand in the public streets for a period of more than ten hours, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than tive nor more than twenty dollars.

Sec. 3. It is hereby made the duty of the City Marshal and his depeties and every policeman in the city, to arrest any person who shall be found violating any of the provisions of Sections I and 2 of this ordinance, and also to take charge of the animal or animals being so cruelly used and to keep the same at the expense of the owner until such visions of Sections I and 2 of this ordinance, and also to take charge of the animal or animals being so cruelly used and to keep the same at the expense of the owner until such case is disposed of.
