U. S. INTERNAL REVENUE .- Mr. J. D. Laman Assistant Assessor of revenue for 2d Division of Washington Territory, requests that the fol-lowing be inserted for the information of tax payers:

Returns of Income for the year ending Decem-ber 31, 1867, must be made by the first Monday

ber 31, 1867. In March 1868.
Articles in Schedule A. to be returned on the same form with the income, and are taxable on the first of March, 1888.
Applications for special or license tax, to be made March 1, for the year commencing May 1,

made Marcal, 1968.

The income and special tax, and taxes on Articles in Schedule A., are due and payable by the 30th of April, 1968.

Strict compliance with the law will save tax-payers from percenting as penalties for failure to make returns, and pay tax.

From Warrens.—Mr. W. C. Wilcox arrived at

Walla Walla on Wednesday, direct from War-rens mines, where he has been engaged most of the winter, constructing a boiler, etc., for the Company owning the Hic Jacet mine. Mr. W. brought down a small 'gold brick,' the product of this mine. Some thirty tons of rock had been crushed, but only a portion of it had been cleaned up. The rield, however, it was thought, would not be great, as the poorest of the rock had been selected with a view only of testing the opera-tion of the Mill—the result being entirely satisfactory in this respect. Mr. Wilcox informed us that there are seventy-two quartz lodes recorded in the Warrens camp, and situated in close proximity to each other. Some of the lodes are immensely rich in gold and silver, and a few of

them range from twenty to thirty feet in width.

Three times as many persons have wintered at Warrens this season as have for two previous winters. A heavy emigration, it is expected, will pour into that camp during the next few months to come. The miners are hopeful, and feel confident that they have the richest mines in Idaho.

Merchants are scarce at Warrens, and all kinds of goods and wares ditto. It is believed to be a good gamp for a few more merchants with well eslected stocks of goods for the trade.

There was but about 18 inches of snow in the mines, and only some 30 inches on the high ranges, when Mr. W. left the diggings. He start-ed overland for Portland, Wednesday evening.

Veracity.—The question of veracity stafted between the President and Grant, appears to have terminated in favor of the former, and with great damage to the character of the latter. Legislature which gives the river region fifteen
members in the House, and the Sound fifteen.
The apportlonment for the river counties is as
follows: Stevens county one; Walla Walla six,
Yakima and Kikitat one, Skamania one, Clark
four, Cowlitz and Wabkiakum two, and Pacific
one. No change in the Council Districts. An
act readistricting the Territory, makes the First
Judicial District to consist of Stevens county
alone, Chief Justice Hewett being assigned to
that District. The Second Judicial District remains as it is. except that Walla Walla alone, Chief distict newett being assigned to that District. The Second Judicial District resmains as it is, except that Walla Walla county is added to it. Judge J. E. Wyche is assigned to this District and will hold court at Walla Walla. Vancouver and Olympia. The Third Judicial District remains as before, with C. Ben. Darwin as Judge.

An act was passed changing the time of holding the sessions of the Legislature, which hereafter will convene on the first Monday in October of each alternate year.

A memorial was passed asking for the annexation of Northern Idabo to Washington Territory.

An appropriation of \$\$4,14380 was made to the Sisters of Charity, of Vancouver, deficiency due for keeping care of the insane.

An act passed appropriating the Territorial the of the central contractions of the counties of Lewis and Cowlitz for the years 1808 1869 and the balance for 1867, for the

1868 1869 and the balance for 1867, for the repair of that portion of the military road, from Olympia to Morticello, passing through those counties. It appropriates about five thousand

The Territorial tax was raised from 31 mills to

An appropriation of \$2,500 was made towards the completion of the road over the Snoqualmic Five hundred dollars was appropriated for the

Five hundred dollars was appropriated for the removal of obstructions in Coultz river. Eight hundred dollars was appropriated for the removal of obstructions in Chehalis river. The fees of all the county officers in Walla Walla county were cut down one-half. A special liquor license law, similar in character to the Oregon law, was passed for the county off Walla Walla.

A new "change of venue law" was passed, which met the opposition of the judges of the Supreme Court and members of the bar. Two divorce bills were passed, both of which Governor Moore vetoed, neither of which passed over the veto. This was the only exercise of the veto power by his Excellency.

A pilot bill passed and received the approval of the Governor. It applies only to San Jund & Fuca Straffs, Paget Sound, etc., but by its own provisions is a dead letter, as all vessels sailing under the American flag are exempt from pilotage.

A bill to change the location of the Capital

A bill to change the location of the Capital from Olympia to Vancouver passed the Gouncil, but died in the hands of a Special Committee of the House. At notime could the bill command over ten rotes out of the thirty in the House. The University matter created considerable sitr. The Board of Regents reported severally against the late President of the University, Daniel Bayley. A Special Committee of the House, after a labored investigation, exonerated Mr. Bayley. The House, after a long debate, failed to adopt either report; but directed the Board of Regents to collect all outstanding indebtedness unsecured. The Council Committee found between both the Board and the House Committee, but finally passed the House reso. Committee, but finally passed the House

Committee, but finally passed the House resolutions of instruction.

A bill providing for holding an election and calting a convention to form a State Constitution was introduced and passed. Under its operation Washington in about four years.

EDITOR STATESMAN: - I notice in one of you papers, a request to your valley friends to write and give you the news. Now, as I consider you part and parcel of us, having the claim of add ing to your valley and commerce one hundred thousand dollars for produce, &c., I take the liberty for the first time, to give you a few items although not very startling, from the ice-bound Camp of 'Koetenatra'-the proper Indian name of the place.

MINING MATTERS I, as well as every other miner here, think that the old Camp will do better than it has ev-er done. Three new Hydraulics will be in operation the coming season. The Nip and Tuck bar will be extensively worked, as the water ditch is being enlarged and other improvements have been made. The McArty Ditch now completed will have abundance of water to work its extensive adjacent grounds. The 'Fear not Shaft' of McGinley & Woods in the Canyon, have 300 yards of drain race dug and 70 feet to complete the work to sink from hard surface and if nothing is struck below, will have good \$20 diggings at that depth. The energy, pa tience, and perseverance of McGinley and Co., after three years hard trying, should be reward. ed, and we all think and hope they may strike it, and big at that. Smith and others are still running their tannels, and get fair prospects.

We have no news from Skookum Chuck, but the boys are after it, and we hope for a favorable prospect from that quarter. Several persons are wintering on Finley Creek, and prospecting.

A large number are wintering at the Columbia Lakes, (headwaters of the east branch of the Lakes, (headwaters of the east branch of the Columbia River) about 100 miles from this place. There are two trading posts there this winter. The Hudson Bay Co. have one post for supplying the Indians articles in exchange for Fars. The Martin caught at this point are very valuable and supposed to be the farcet in the ble and supposed to be the finest in the world. Cattle and horses winter well, and there is very little snow. The land is rich and well watered with no late frosts, and bids fair to be 'Colville No. 2,' from present indications. I notice that James Gelbraith has got seeds

enough from San Francisco to keep the boys in onions and cabbage next winter if he has any onions and causes be could not get garden seeds at Walla Walla, as there was none to spare. Your farmers ought to put up some seed for market, to supply the small places outside with good fresh seeds, put up in strong papers. This good resu seeds, put up in strong phyers. Owing to the compara-tively slender knowledge of the outer world of the resources of Owyhee, together with the hoscaped the attention of capitalists. Just now, however, it is receiving the bulk of investments, and it pleases me to inform you that San Francisco monied men have at last discovered the fact that their surplus capital would find profitable investment in this long ignored country The "Rising Star" mine, the most promined ledge, formerly owned by some Portland merchants, has lately been disposed of to several "Bay" capitalists, who have already organized a Joint Stock Company. They intend to put up a forty 'stamper' next spring, and beyond doubt will bring this gay district into notoriety, at San Francisco. Following the lead of the Ri-sing Star are the Twilight, U. S. Grant, Lexlax than, Frost and Rochester. There are now two mills in successful operation, having a capacity of 15 stamps. The district is also divided into two towns, and the same spirit of trivary which has been prevailing between Ruby and Silver, has been initiated by the cities of Oro and Owybee. The latter, however, has succeeded in carrying off the prize, being in possession of the Post Office, which, of course, is considered rue place. But it with no doubt make you smiletowrite you that these bitter antagonists are just as remote from each other as the Statesmax printing office and Frank & Werthelmer's store at Walla Walla; separated only by a rocky bluff. There are about 200 persons employed in that district, principally working for wages. Communication is kept up with Silver by means of a daily stage line, dwurdt by a former citizen of Walla Walla.

Wages command \$5 per day, and laborers are getting scarce, owing to the Willow creek excitement. Nevertheless the population is estimated at 2500 souls. There are also about 500 Chinamon employed in cooking and washing. When spring opens, however, they intend to rework the placer quies on Jordan ereek.
