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A Road to Tide Water.

The Tacoma Letter publishes the following:

"A prominent banker of Eastern Washington has shown a very decided interest in the project of a road to tide water from the mouth of the Cowlitz river to the mouth of the Willapa river."

While we must candidly admit that the people of Eastern Washington are fully alive to the fact that property would depreciate in value if there was no immediate possibility of a road to tide water from the Sound we cannot admit that values have shrunk in the slightest appreciable degree.

At present things are somewhat at a standstill owing solely to the rather uncertain state of railroad affairs. This is the situation. For years past the hopes of the citizens of Eastern Washington, Eastern Oregon and Idaho have been centered on the day when they would have direct communication with tide water on Puget Sound.

Up to within the past few weeks it was considered as among the near possibilities that Mr. Willard would certainly build a road to tide water from the mouth of our territory, and so far as any one knows such may be his intention even now. Our people are in a predicament; we are between two fires, and either party can benefit us by giving us communication with the sea, but the question is, will they do it? So far we have received no definite answer that either will accomplish the wish so dear to the heart of all of us in the Cascades. There is a feeling averse to Portland for the reason that its citizens have always fattened upon our helplessness, and never showed any interest in our progress.
