Our Washington Letter.

WASHINGTON, March 26, 1879. The legislative situation is not simplified since one week ago to-day. There is not entire harmony among democrats as to demanding all that was deflected by the last House, though every democrat in Congress will insist upon the substance of it.

THE SENATE removed many of its officers on Tuesday, putting democrats in the place of republicans. Several of the subordinate officers, who had become personally acquainted with all the senators, or who had held their places for very many years, and were especially familiar with the duties of their places, were retained.

THE EVIDENCE in the breach of promise case of Mrs. Oliver against ex-Senator Simon Cameron has not yet shown a positive and uncontradicted promise of marriage, but it has developed unmistakably a state of morals the like of which was not suspected by most of the senator's friends.

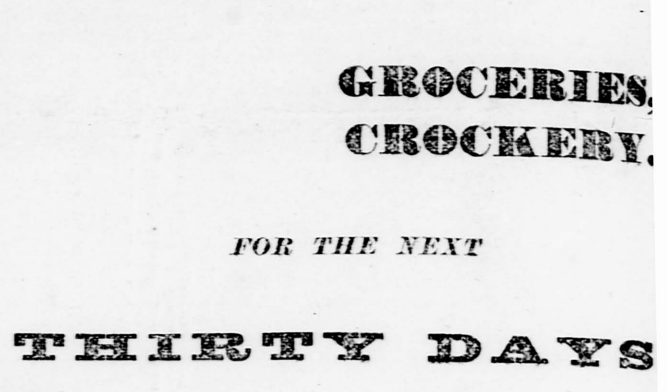
