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Our Washington Letter.

WASHINGTON, March 28, 1878. EDITOR STATESMAN.—Senator Howe on Monday told what he had to tell about the administration. It is apparent that about 9 out of 10 republicans in Wisconsin have a warm hatred of Hayes and Schurz, and Howe doubtless saw the necessity, if he is to be his own successor as senator from that state, of putting himself on the same platform they occupy.

SENATOR BLAINE BACKED DOWN.—Yesterday from the position he had previously occupied of opposition to paying the fishery award of five and a half millions, and said he was willing it should be paid for the sake of national honor; but that we had received no consideration for the amount, and he wanted protection against similar payments in the future.

By a vote of 137 to 114 the house yesterday made Mr. Wood's tariff bill the special order for Tuesday next. Up to the time of the vote a great many had expected a contrary result, and that the bill would be tabled and thus killed; but the general conviction that a tariff revision was a necessity, and that radical changes in duties in some respects are desirable, had its effect on the house, and the vote was as above given.

Its great success in Virginia, added to the interest caused by the fact that congress was investigating it with a view to its adoption for use in the district, has caused a lively inquiry into the workings of the Mallett punch for registering drinks sold at bars.

Cooked Up States.

At a time when certain ambitious officials are endeavoring to smuggle Washington territory into the Union as a state, it may interest our readers to know what is thought of movements of this character in the older states. To commence with, we find that the Washington correspondent of the New York Times has sounded the alarm, and summoned senators to consider the question presented and adopt some comprehensive system to apply to thinly populated territories which desire to become states.

NEVADA WAS ADMITTED with a population of 12,000 in 1859, and in seventeen years has increased to 32,540—less than one-half the population required for a member of congress in the older states. Colorado was admitted two years ago, with a population of less than 40,000 in 1876, which, however, had materially increased in 1878.

UTAH, with a population of 89,738 in 1870, is an applicant for admission; and there are the territories of Arizona, New Mexico, Wyoming and Dakota, which may be considered in training. The need of these territories for a state government is generally in proportion to the energy and ambition of local politicians, who want to be senators.

AN OREGON BOY.—Henry Churchill, the person spoken of in the dispatches as being implicated in the murder of T. Wallace More, near San Buenaventura about one week ago, in Southern California, is an Oregon boy, and formerly resided in Polk county. Mr. W. Churchill, his father, still resides at Monmouth. Hearing of the great misfortune which has befallen his son, Mr. Churchill came down yesterday from Salem, and called last evening on the outgoing steamer for San Francisco. On arriving in that city he will proceed at once to San Buenaventura to be present at the trial of Henry. From the dispatches published, young Churchill appears to be seriously implicated in the terrible tragedy. No one stood higher or fairer in the public estimation than did young Churchill when he lived in Polk county, and it is difficult for all his old friends and acquaintances to believe that Henry has taken any hand in the murder of More.—Oregonian.

The Small Pox Controversy.

Truth requires but one defender; falsehood needs a thousand. The cases of small pox (so-called) which occurred here, have given rise to a great deal of discussion upon the subject, and had the exponents of the varicella theory seen fit to confine the discussion to local arbitration, it would probably have ended some time ago; but when Dr. Bingham goes entirely outside of the record, and invokes the aid of a stock committee of physicians in Portland, who never saw the children until after their recovery, he shows how weak and indefensible is his position in the case. Now this is a very simple matter; there either has or has not been small pox in Walla Walla. Dr. Bingham, backed up by a clique in the city of Portland, says it was small pox, and Drs. Boyd, Goodwin and McCurdy, say to the contrary. The conclusion of Portland celebrities, whose manifestos was published in the STATESMAN of March 15th, say that the boy Harmon was troubled with disease; and they hope to show that much of the ailment arose from indiscreet physicians, as distinguished from confluent. Among the parties whose names have been used without authority in the premises, is Dr. Baker, of the garrison, who denies having permitted Dr. Bingham the use of his name in the controversy. Also, Dr. J. H. Day, who says that he thought it looked like small pox, but expressed no positive opinion. Will Neal and wife, whose names have been freely used in this controversy, also deny having expressed any such opinions as set forth in Dr. Bingham's manifesto. We now submit the following affidavits of Mrs. Rifke, Mrs. Harmon, and others, more directly connected with the matters:

TERRITORY OF WASHINGTON, J. SS. County of Walla Walla, J.

On this 10th day of April, 1878, before me, J. D. Laman, a justice of the peace in and for the said county and territory, personally appeared William Kohlhauff, who being first duly sworn, deposes and says: My name is William Kohlhauff, I am 49 years of age, residing in Walla Walla city, W. T.; occupation, hotel keeper; I am and have been for the last seven years keeping the St. Louis hotel, in Walla Walla city, W. T., as proprietor thereof, and in regard to an article published in the STATESMAN of February 23d, 1878, over the signature of J. E. Bingham, M. D., wherein it is stated that about the middle of last December, two families named Harmon and Wolf, arrived from the east, etc., and that they proceeded to the St. Louis hotel, but were not sick with measles, is not all true; it is true that the two families did arrive about the time mentioned in the STATESMAN, but they did not come to the St. Louis hotel as stated in said paper; nor were they refused admittance as stated on account of measles or on account of their sickness; but the facts are that Mr. Harmon, husband and father of one of the families, had made an arrangement with me the day before the families arrived, to meet them at the depot and take them to Mr. Harber's place on Mill creek, when the families did arrive, and I met the families of Harmon and Wolf at the Mill creek depot and took them to the house of Jo Harber, on Mill creek. TERRITORY OF WASHINGTON, J. SS. County of Walla Walla, J.

I, CHARLES FESS, do solemnly swear that I am a citizen of the United States, over thirty-two years of age; that Mr. Joseph Harber stated to me that Dr. J. E. Bingham contended with him (Harber) that I was the man that had been exposed to the small pox, and called the boy, near Mr. Harber's; that I had gone to the Spokane Falls station in a letter, referred to in what he published in the WALLA WALLA STATESMAN, of Feb. 23d, 1878, as coming from Mrs. S. G. Havenale, which reads as he published it, as follows: There is great excitement among the people of Walla Walla, and it is a fact that the government freight train Monday; he was sick when he got here and the next day it was discovered he had the small pox; they put up tent below the post, and moved him there to-day; we have not learned his name; they say he is very sick; some soldiers who have had the small pox are taking care of him and the post surgeon is attending him. He says he was exposed to those immigrants in Walla Walla, but thought he would take it if it will accommodate Dr. Bingham, I will add that I am the one referred to by him; and further, it is true, I was exposed to the disease at Mr. Harmon's and Mr. Wolf's, Bingham calls small pox. I have never been vaccinated, and did not take any precautions against the disease; I inhaled with the small pox, and I never saw taken what Bingham calls small pox, and have not been sick at all since being exposed to Bingham's small pox; and further, said Harmon and Wolf's families tell me that I was the only one exposed to the sick children who left the neighborhood; and that further, I have seen the children since Mrs. Harmon's return from Portland with the Dr.'s certificates, and say that they do not look like they ever had the small pox or any other skin disease.

TERRITORY OF WASHINGTON, J. SS. County of Walla Walla, J.

On this 27th day of March, 1878, before me, J. D. Laman, a justice of the peace in and for the said county and territory, personally appeared Rebecca J. Rifke, who being first duly sworn, deposes and says: My name is Rebecca J. Rifke; I am the identical person who made the statement as to what I called malpractice of Dr. J. E. Bingham, in the case of the late Mrs. Harber, and mentioned in the WALLA WALLA STATESMAN of February 23d, 1878. I further say that I know that Mrs. Harber had no fever during her last sickness; I was with Mrs. Harber from the time Dr. Bingham pronounced that Mrs. Harber had the small pox up to the time she died. From all that I can learn of the symptoms of small pox, and that Harber did not have the least sign of it; and further, I met daily all the children that Dr. Bingham says had the small pox, and they have so far recovered since Mrs. Harmon returned from Portland with the child she took with her, and as far as I can see, so signs that the child or any of the children have been sick with small pox or sick at all, has disappeared; there is no signs of pits; and I further say that all I stated as to the manner Dr. J. E. Bingham used ice cold water in the case of the late Mrs. Harber, was and is true, and as I stated in my first statement I now reaffirm as true. From all I can learn of the symptoms of small pox there has not been a case in Mr. Harber's family, nor Mr. Wolf's, nor Mr. Harmon's family, since arriving in Walla Walla county. I further say that I have no part of my former affidavit suppressed, but the same appeared in print as I gave it to H. Parker, notary public. REBECCA J. RIFKE.

TERRITORY OF WASHINGTON, J. SS. County of Walla Walla, J.

On this 27th day of March, 1878, before me, J. D. Laman, a justice of the peace in and for the said county and territory, personally appeared Sarah A. Harmon, who being first duly sworn, deposes and says: My name is Sarah A. Harmon; I am the identical person who signed the certificate for Dr. J. E. Bingham, referring to my son Charles, published in the WALLA WALLA STATESMAN, March 15th, 1878; I further say that Dr. Bingham urged me to insist on my taking my boy to Portland at his expense, including traveling expenses, good wages for our time, and a present besides of a suit of clothes and square over Dr. Bingham's, which he charged my husband for two visits, including medicine. I inquired of one of the Portland doctors, who gave a certificate, that if my son had the small pox, what certificate is published with the rest, what I should do with the bedding and clothes that had been used while my boy had the small pox, as he alleged, when he told me that the same as I would wash any other clothes, but to soak the woolen clothes a day or two in cold water, which I neglected to do; I cannot believe that any of my children have had the small pox; I solemnly swear that the least sign that the boy took before ever had the small pox, or even the chicken pox. Dr. Bingham published in the WALLA WALLA STATESMAN of the 6th of February last, that the two families, Harmon and Wolf, were refused admittance to the St. Louis hotel, and that some of the children were sick with the measles. I say in re-

ply, that it was not and is not true, as we did not stay at any place in Walla Walla, but arrangements were already made on our arrival in Walla Walla to proceed to Mr. Harber's without delay. And further, the only man that was exposed to the supposed small pox who left the neighborhood was Mr. Coates, and he was not sick, and did not go to Spokane Falls, which it seems to me Dr. Bingham would have the public believe from his communication, published in the STATESMAN of February 9th, 1878.

The following persons were exposed during our sickness and did not take the disease: Cyrus Harmon, Isaac Wolf, Hannah L. Wolf, Joseph Harber, Emma Harber, Rebecca Rifke, Green Rifke, Noah Evans, Asa Evans, Chas. Fess, Elizabeth Moshel, Lew Whitmore, Chas. Terry and three of Mr. Harber's oldest children, Frank Harmon, a child eight years of age, who slept with one of the sick children near a bed after the child was taken sick, and others whose names I do not remember. I further say that my statement published in the STATESMAN of the 23d of February, was and is true. SARAH A. HARMON.

Wolf; I am the same person who signed the statement in regard to the late supposed small pox case, published in the WALLA WALLA STATESMAN of February 23d, 1878, and my first statement; and further say that the children have all so far recovered that there is no pits on any of them at this time; from all I can learn of the symptoms of small pox, I cannot see any signs that any of my children, or Mr. Harmon's children, ever had the small pox. I repeat, Dr. Bingham did not tell us that we had the black measles, but one of them might be sick with scarlet fever or erysipelas; that he could tell what it was after he saw his books. I further say that none of the evidence of Mrs. Rifke, Mrs. Harmon and myself was suppressed in our first statement, but it was all published as we gave it. HANNAH L. WOLF.

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THE LOUISIANA SERIOUS FARGE.—The supreme Court of Louisiana has reversed the verdict of the Court below, in the case of returning board Anderson, and ordered his discharge from custody. In substance, the court holds that forgery and perjury are not crimes, when committed against the people of a state, in such a way as to set aside their honest vote at a presidential election, and to debrand the republic of its clearly elected chief magistrate. It was to the credit of the infamous Jeffreys that, with all his atrocious conduct in criminal cases, in civil law his judgments were mainly just. We are not aware that this measure of saving praise can justly be awarded the Louisiana supreme court judges. The synopsis of the decision, as reported in the dispatches, gives the impression that the court was more disposed to please Hayes, than to maintain the law, or to do justice.

THE ELECTION, Tuesday last, passed off quietly, and had it not been for the fact that under the law all the saloons were closed, it is doubtful whether any considerable number of people would have known that an election was being held. The two precincts into which Walla Walla is divided cast a little over one hundred votes. To show how utterly indifferent our people were to the election, it is only necessary to say that the two precincts numbered full eight hundred votes. The vote polled was about one out of eight, and of those who voted very many cut off the names of the delegates to the constitutional convention, and simply voted against the "railroad subsidy."
